Arkansas sales tax holiday set Aug. 3-4

The Arkansas sales tax holiday will be Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 3 and 4.

Consumers will not have to pay sales tax on any articles of clothing that cost less than \$100.

Accessories are also on the list of exempted items, as long as they cost less than \$50.

More than 65 categories of cosmetics are exempt from the sales

School supplies will be exempt from the sales tax, including pens, pencils and paper as well as art supplies.

Laptops, desktops, tablets, printers, keyboards, calculators, cell phones, e-readers and monitors are exempt from the sales tax.

Nashville Husqvarna facilities purchased; warehouse, manufacturing plant included

The Husqvarna manufacturing plant and warehouse in Nashville ĥave been bought by Phoenix Investors of Milwaukee, Wisc., according to Mayor Larry Dunaway.

Both properties could be found on the Phoenix website Tuesday morning. Phoenix says it is a "national commercial real estate firm" based in Milwaukee. "Our core business is revitalization of former manufacturing companies throughout the United States."

Phoenix has properties in 29

Husqvarna announced last year that it will close the Nashville operation by the end of 2024. Job cuts will begin in September and continue into December, with 408 workers affected.

Dunaway was on a Zoom call with Phoenix officials Friday, July 26, along with representatives of Husqvarna and the Developing Howard County board of directors.

"Something they said during the call piqued my interest," Dunaway said. "Phoenix has sent emails to hundreds of companies they work with about the Husqvarna property" as the company looks for potential buyers.

Once Phoenix takes over the Nashville facilities, "The first thing they will do is start a clean-up,' Dunaway was told Friday. "They will get rid of leftover equipment and strip the buildings clean. They will paint if need be. They want buyers to come in it and imagine their business going on there.'

The clean-up will begin after Husqvarna vacates the buildings and is expected to take about two months, Dunaway said.

Local officials are "working on a complete roster of companies that could support a new manufacturing plant," according to Dunaway, including Mission Plastics and Jan-Eze Plating, Inc.

Phoenix officials will visit Nashville in about three weeks, Dunaway was told. "They will go back over the facility and do a punchlist to prepare for sale or lease."

Dunaway said the Zoom meeting with Kurt Jenson, senior VP Acquisition and Leasing, and others at Phoenix Investors lasted about 20 minutes. Jenson was unaware of the lithium operations which have begun in Southwest Arkansas and was "very interested" in the possibilities they might offer.

Dunaway told Jenson that he looks forward to their face-to-face meeting in Nashville. "We'll get more of an idea of what they're looking at." Officials from state agencies and Venessa Weeks, director of Developing Howard County, are among those likely to meet with the Phoenix representatives.

"I'm proud we have an announcement," Dunaway said. He awaits more information about the future of the warehouse and manu-

facturing plant. As the Husqvarna closure approaches, "The mood in Nashville will be at a low ebb" until plans for the facility are an-

Dunaway said he has been contacted by officials in other cities about the Husqvarna plant and sale to Phoenix. "There's a lot of interest. Now that the property has sold, we can start on the next step. I'm feeling good after the call" with Jenson.

More details about the sale are expected this week in a statement from Phoenix Investors.

"I'm looking forward to them coming," Dunaway said. "I've done some research. They're the

Jenson said Phoenix is "keying in on how many will lose jobs. He said he is looking at companies big enough to fill those jobs that are being lost," according to Dunaway.

Hospital receives installment of fed funds

Howard Memorial Hospital has received its second round of funding from the American Rescue Plan Act, according to CFO Bill Craig.

The hospital received \$1,376,735 June 28, Craig told the board of directors Tuesday, July 23.

HMH was among 18 Arkansas hospitals which were awarded a total of \$60 million to help them during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Federal Covid relief funds were distributed by members of the Arkansas Legislature.

Second round funds also went to Fulton County Hospital in Salem, Eureka Springs Hospital in Eureka Springs, Arkansas Methodist Medical Center in Paragould and Baxter County Regional Medical Center at Mountain Home.

Craig announced the receipt of the federal funds during his financial report to the board.

For June, Howard Memorial had 135.9 days cash on hand,

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


That Last Supper

The staging of this Last Supper was INTENDED to offend. Let me say it again: The staging of this Last Supper was INTENDED



Arkansas sales tax holiday to be held Aug. 3-4; lengthy list exempt from tax

The Arkansas sales tax holi-

day this year will be on the first weekend in August, Saturday and Sunday, August 3 and 4.

Consumers will not have to pay sales tax on any articles of clothing that cost less than \$100.

The exempted items include pants, shirts, dresses and shoes. Also free from sales tax are bathing suits, baby blankets, underwear, raincoats, uniforms, hats and caps, aprons, neckties, scarves and steeltoes boots.

Diapers, even disposal diapers, are included on the list of exempt

However, sports equipment will not be exempt, so you will pay sales tax on cleats, baseball gloves, goggles, life preservers, shin guards and shoulder pads.

Accessories are also on the list of exempted items, as long as they cost less than \$50. The list of articles is extensive, and includes handbags and purses, sunglasses, jewelry, hair notions, wallets, watches and wigs.

More than 65 categories of cosmetics are exempt from the sales tax, such as mascara, many types

and fingernail remover, bath salts, artificial eyelashes, perfume and stretch mark cream.

School supplies will be exempt from the sales tax. Officially the first weekend of August is called the sales tax holiday, but many people refer to it as the "Back to School" sales tax holiday. That's because the legislature intentionally scheduled it for early August, to benefit families with children going to school.

School supplies include pens, pencils and paper as well as art

Thanks to Act 944 of 2021, approved by the legislature earlier this year, some electronic and computer equipment were added to the list of tax exempt items.

Laptops, desktops, tablets, printers, keyboards, calculators, cell phones, e-readers and monitors are exempt from the sales tax.

However, video games, stereos and televisions are not included.

Arkansas families will save an estimated \$2.6 million on purchases of electronic and computer equipment.

The sales tax exemption applies to single articles, and is not based of hair products, fingernail polish on the overall cost of everything

you buy. For example, you can buy three shirts \$25 each and a pair of pants for \$50 and you will not be charged the sales tax, even though the total is \$125. Because each item is less than \$100, the exemption is applied.

However, if you buy a pair of shoes for \$120, you will have to pay the sales tax on the full amount of the purchase.

When you take advantage of a sale that allows you to buy one item and get another for a reduced price, the holiday exemption applies only to the items costing less than \$100. For example, a store may offer a pair of jeans for \$120 and you can get a second pair for half price, or \$60. The sales tax exemption will apply only to the second pair.

The exemption applies to all sales taxes, not just state sales taxes. That means exempt items are free of all city, county and local

All retailers have to participate. Articles cannot be separated in order to lower their price under the \$100 and \$50 thresholds. Men's suits and pairs of shoes, which normally are sold as one unit, cannot be split into separate purchases.

U.S. marks 80th anniversary of GI Bill

anniversary of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, more commonly known as the GI Bill. This landmark legislation created a pathway for returning troops to further their education, buy homes and launch businesses. The innovative policy remains a significant investment in our service members and serves as an important aspect of the effort to honor the commitment we made to the men and women who wear our nation's

uniform. It was a groundbreaking idea championed by The American Legion based on feedback from veterans aimed at ensuring those returning from service in WWII had the support they needed as they transitioned back to civilian life by providing funds for college, housing and unemployment insurance. President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the measure into law June 22, 1944.

The law helped usher in prosperity during the post war era. Within the first seven years of implementation, eight million veterans received education benefits, more than doubling the number of college degrees awarded between 1940 to 1950.

The GI Bill has become fundamental to helping those who have been called to serve this country.

Arkansas veterans have shared This year we celebrate the 80th how valuable their GI Bill benefits were to prepare them for a successful future. In interviews for the Veterans History Project, a collection of oral histories housed in the Library of Congress, WWII veteran Lieutenant Colonel William Ledbetter said he used his benefits for college at the University of Central Arkansas where he earned a degree in social studies and minored in physical education. Edith Mitchell served in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps in WWII and, following her military service, earned a master's degree in voice and public music from Columbia University. Vietnam veteran Master Sergeant Parnell Fisher completed his bachelor's degree in education from Arkansas Baptist College with his GI bill

As a member of Veterans' Affairs Committees in both the Senate and House of Representatives, I've supported legislation to modernize and update the GI Bill in order to better meet the needs of this generation's former servicemembers.

In 2008, Congress passed the post-9/11 GI Bill and nine years later followed that up with the Harry W. Colmery Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2017, named after an Army Air Service veteran and former national commander of the American Legion. Known as the Forever GI Bill, it reflects the changing landscape of learning and expands authority for veterans to pursue science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) programs.


The bill enhanced educational benefits and eliminated the 15-year limitation on post-9/11 GI Bill benefits for eligible veterans and their dependents.

It also included a reform I advocated to ensure wounded members of the National Guard and Reserve are eligible for the same GI Bill benefits as active-duty military members.

We closely followed its implementation and when the Department of Veterans Affairs failed to reimburse veterans for missed or underpaid Forever GI Bill housing benefits, I worked to correct

These are all earned benefits, not hand-outs. Since they were enacted, they have changed lives and helped incentivize voluntary service in our Armed Forces.

This milestone is a good time to reflect on the tremendous sacrifice of the brave individuals willing to stand in defense of our country. We are forever grateful to the men and women who wear our nation's uniform and the GI Bill continues to demonstrate our appreciation for their service.

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





'A Real-Life Rosie The Riveter' Special ceremony Saturday in Glenwood to honor Howard County native

a special ceremony held in honor of Howard County native and "real-life Rosie the Riveter" Mary Bell (Parsons) Davis, who will also be celebrating her 100th birthday.

The event will be held at the Glenwood Fish Nest Restaurant with a 12 noon luncheon.

Davis will be presented the Rosie The Riveter Congressional Gold Medal of Honor, one of less that 200 authorized by the U.S. Congress. The presentation will be made by Camden Mayor Charlotte Young to Davis as the last surviving "Rosie the Riveter" from the Sam and Nettie Parsons family. Also in attendance will be Laura Wright, president of the American Rosie The Riveter Association.

Davis' sisters, Florene (Parsons) Thompson and Hazel (Parsons) Ward were also workers during World War II and will be recognized posthumously with the family's oldest son, Seldon Parsons, to celebrate this 95th birthday.

Congress authorized the Medal of Honor to honor the 6,000,000 women

and weapons factories replacing men who had gone to war during Word War II and in doing so forever changed the culture of America."

Davis and her sisters served their county during World War II by working in the Lone Star Army Ammunition Plant, Texarkana, and the Shumaker Naval Ammunition Depot, which produced "sidewinder" missiles and other weapons. The Shumnaker barracks still exist and preserved as historical buildings in Camden.

Davis was born and reared in Howard County and is a long-time Marshall County, Oklahoma resident, retired from Madill Walmart at the age of 80. It's unclear if Davis is the only other living "Riveter" in Oklahoma, according to Davis' daughter, Glenda Gail Parker of Alexandria, Virginia.

Parker said she grew up hearing her mother talk about her and the two sisters working during the war.

"And while I may not have all the facts completely straight, as I understand it, there was a conveyor-belt

On Saturday, Aug. 3, there will be "who went to work in the munitions" for grenade assembly a the Shumaker Ammunition Depot. Occasionally, a pin would fall out of a grenade but there was a barricade in front of the conveyor-belt, an explosives bin for the rejects and live grenades.

"The women were supposed to grab the live grenade, throw it in the bin, yell something...like 'bend over and kiss it' then everyone hit the floor. One woman lost her arm doing that, but she saved several lives in the process."

Davis is the youngest and only surviving daughter of the family's six girls. All five of her brother and five sisters served the war. She has two serving brothers, Gerald Parons and Seldon Parsons, both of Fort Smith.

Parker noted that when the 6,000,000 working women returned home after the war, "the baby boom started."

Davis went back to work later in life and worked 34 years at Walmart. Her daughter said her mom never achieved her ambition of getting a college degree; however, all four of her children did and her son became an attorney, according to Parker.
