# Footprints of a Pike County hero

MURFREESBORO -- On December 7, 1941 a total of 2,403 people died from a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor.

That day 2,335 service members were killed, of those 2,335 service members 1,177 were killed on the USS Arizona, 429 on the USS Oklahoma, 106 on the USS West Virginia, and 105 on the USS California. Some 68 civilians were killed by enemy action and some by friendly fire.

This is a story of one of those service members from Pike County who died on the USS Oklahoma as a result of one of the deadliest attacks on the United States until September 11, 2001

The Oklahoma was destroyed by multiple torpedoes. Some estimated as many as nine torpedoes, which tore a large opening on the left side of the ship causing the Oklahoma to roll almost completely over. The large opening caused the ship to capsized within 12 minutes. The sinking of the Oklahoma had the greatest loss of life after the USS Arizona.

Who was this Pike County Hero who was a member of the USS Oklahoma? Water Tender Second Class Clarence M. Lockwood and this is my attempt create his footsteps.

Our hero, Lockwood, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence C. Lockwood and was born June 18, 1922 in Smithton, Arkansas which is near Gurdon, Arkansas.

According to the book *The Fighting Men Of Arkansas Of WW2*, Lockwood attended schools in Arkadelphia, Shreveport, LA and Delight, and enlisted in the US Navy on January 31, 1939 and graduated from high school in May 28, 1939.

He received his boot training at the U.S. Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif. and went to sea March 1940. WT2 Lockwood was killed December 7, 1941.

Following the attack by the Japanese his remains were recovered from the Oklahoma. There was a large effort to recover survivors and the remains of service members from the Arizona, Oklahoma, California and West Virginia.

At that time, following the attack, Lockwood remains, along with others, could not be individually identified. Lockwood was buried as an unknown at the National Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu, Hawaii.

In 2015 the Deputy Secretary of Defense issued directing the disinterment of the unknowns from the USS Oklahoma and using forensic analysis DNA process to identified Lockwood's remains. U. S. Government merged two organizations and is known as the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, AKA DPAA. Their mission is to provide the fullest possible accounting of missing American service members to their families and the nation.

The Pike County Archives and History Society was asked to assist in locating any living relatives of WT2 Clarence M. Lockwood.

Lockwood was buried February 11, 2019, at Arlington National Cemetery. Also, Clarence M. Lockwood's name is inscribed on the Pike County War Memorial, which is located at the Pike County Courthouse in Murfreesboro.

The following day, December 8, 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt makes his well-known speech: "Yesterday, December 7, 1941 -- a date which will live in infamy -- the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan."

# Chamber readies for holiday celebrations

City may look to re-census after official findings eliminate them from grant contention

MURFREESBORO – The Murfreesboro Chamber of Commerce discussed their upcoming holiday events for December at their November monthly meeting last week.

Volunteers from the chamber finished renovating the Christmas decorations that go around town last weekend, Ricky Branch will be setting them up sometime this week.

The Pike County Courthouse will reportedly be doing their own decorating this year, save for placement of the Chamber's large Christmas Tree that traditional sits on the courthouse grounds, allowing the chamber to spread their efforts around town.

This Saturday, Dec. 7, at 8 a.m. the third annual Diamond Jingle Bell 5K Fun Run will be held. The race, that starts at 325 Main Street and goes toward Kadoha Indian Village and back, will start at 8 a.m. Proceeds from the race go toward local non-profit efforts, including the Angel Tree program. Participation in the race costs \$25 and may be registered at runsignup.com/Race/AR/Murfreesboro/Murfreesboro5K.

Additionally on the morning of Dec. 7, from 9-11 a.m., the Murfreesboro Band Boosters will host A Very Grinchmas Breakfast – with special guest The Grinch. The event will be held at the Murfreesboro Senior Adult Center and will cost \$5/plate. The price includes breakfast, crafts, a treat and a digital photo with the Grinch.

To conclude the activities on Dec. 7, Santa will be delivered to the Pike County Courthouse Square by the Murfreesboro Volunteer Fire Department at 2 p.m. Once there, he will hear the Christmas wishes of the children in attendance, pose for photographs and hand out fruit and candy bags provided to him by the City of Murfreesboro.

Fast forward to Thursday, Dec. 12 and the Chamber will host their ever popular "Taste of Christmas" meal fundraiser at the Murfreesboro Senior Adult Center from 11 a.m.-1:30 p.m. The meal features ham, dressing and a variety of sides and desserts prepared by local churchgoers. The cost of meal, which may be eaten there or in a to-go format, will cost \$10 or greater donation to the Chamber.

At 5 p.m. later that evening on Dec. 7, the Chamber will conduct the annual Christmas Parade under the theme of "Light up Murfreesboro." Lineup for the parade will be in front of the former Pike County Hospital at 5 p.m. and begin traversing toward the other end of town at 6 p.m.

Local businesses will be encouraged by the Chamber to hold extended hours that night following the parade. In addition, registration will be available at participating businesses starting December 7 through the night of the parade, with the Chamber drawing for prizes and chamber bucks.

Murfreesboro Mayor Jim O'Neal was on hand at the meeting to explain a problem the



city currently has – the most recent national census found the town to be too wealthy, negating Murfreesboro's ability to qualify for many grant programs until the next census in 2030.

O'Neal said the city had slipped below the 51% Low to Moderate Income (LMI) designation according to the 2020 census figures. He said the numerical growth of vocational rental homes in Murfreesboro contributed to the issue, as they formerly housed low to moderate income residents and families.

He added that to contest the status, the city would have to essentially resurvey the city for census numbers – by mailouts, phone or in person, and the difficulties of the former two choices should people not take the time to return a mailout or answer the phone.

O'Neal said that much of Pike County and surrounding communities were facing the same issue, including Norman in Montgomery County with a population of around 400, who was working through the logistics of challenging the findings themselves.

The Murfreesboro Mayor said he would look further into the issue and formulate a plan that may or may not include a town hall meeting.

A letter was shared with those in attendance stating that the Arkansas Department of Transportation was going to hold a pre-recorded virtual public meeting on their website concerning the Wolf Creek Bridge on Highway 29 near Antoine.



# **Tourism Commission agrees** to lease property to business

MURFREESBORO - The Advertising Murfreesboro and Tourism Commission voted to accept a plan that will tie them to their rental property for the next five years.

The commission was approached about renting the house they own at 123 South Washington – located across the street from the former City Service Station on Court Street by Arkansas Counseling and Psychodiagnostics (ACP).

The property, which was formerly rented by a pair of individuals and most recently former Murfreeesboro High School basketball coach Kevin Alexander, had come open following Alexander's departure to Marmaduke High School.

ACP is a mental health counseling service that has been serving the South Pike County School District since 2014 and to the local community since 2017. They also have offices located in Arkadelphia, and are currently located in

Murfreesboro between Sonic Drive-In and the Pike County Jail facility.

"Current trends are showing and increased need for mental health services for community members in the area and [ACP] requires additional square footage and community visibility than our current location allows," said the request from ACP to the commission.

ACP will look to transform the residence into an office type building with a projected overhaul of \$60,000. As such, they asked for a reduction in rent over the span of the next half-decade that totals \$18,000, which is 30% of the expected renovation costs. Upgrades to the building will include ADA compliant entrances, access to facilities by accrediting agencies as well as updating and cleaning of the building's ex-

Commission chairman Jamie Terrell that having the location housing a business was better for the community than the residence being inhabited by a family in its now very visible location - the property used to be blocked from the highway by the Glynda's Fashions building prior to its demolition.

The plan is to start rent at \$300/month and the rate will increase by \$100/year over the course of the rental period, with a cap of \$800/month thereafter for further lease agreements.

The agreement also will likely include ACP being first in line for future lease agreements, as well as first right of refusal for purchase of the property should the commission decide to sell the prop-

By agreeing to lock down the property for the next five years, the commission's original plan of obtaining a festival space near the square will be kicked well down the road. A lease agreement will be produced and approved by both sides prior to any official deal being completed.

### Second half of pair sentenced for child abuse

MURFREESBORO -- The other half of the Glenwood couple charged earlier this year with seriously injuring two small children plead guilty to two counts of permitting the abuse of minors Monday in Pike County Circuit Court.

Michael Earl Shepherd, 27, was sentenced to 10 years in the Arkansas Department of Corrections with five years suspended.

Cheyanne Hildbrand, who is Shepherd's girlfriend and mother of the children involved, was sentenced in July to a total of 40 years in the ADC with a consecutive sentence of 40 years on each charge. Hilbrand, who was reportedly pregnant at the time of her trial, underwent and was cleared by a mental evaluation before proceeding with a plea entry.

The charges against the couple are connected to an investigation that began in January when health officials received a hotline report concerning neglect of juvenile twins with concerns of malnourishment and "that the parents are not capable for caring for the children."

On Jan. 18, the twins were taken to a pediatrician in Hot Springs who determined the girl needed to be sent by ambulance to Arkansas Children's Hospital after being found to have "bilateral subdural hemorrhages and torn frenulum in the mouth." The boy was also transported by Shepherd in his personal vehicle to ACH where doctors determined he also needed to be admitted for a "possible skull fracture and brain bleeds."

A preliminary report indicated that both children had "healing" fractures that were determined to be twoto seven-weeks-old and were described as "non-accidental trauma" with child abuse suspected.

Hildbrand reportedly admitted in an interview that, due to anger issues for which she fails to take her prescribed medication for, she had handled the babies in a manner that caused their injuries.

Shepherd admitted in an interview that he had witnessed Hildbrand abusing the children but he never reported it because he as trying to cover for her. Shepherd also said in the interview that once he and his girlfriend found out about the injuries they concocted a story "to tell authorities to on their behalf."

Also Monday in Pike County court, Joshua Allen Scott,

40, who has a Mineral Springs address in court records, plead "true" to violating the terms of his probation and guilty to failure to register as a sex offender. Scott was sentenced to four years in the ADC with three years suspended. Scott will be officially sentenced on Jan. 6.

Jessica Smallwood, 35, of Gurdon, plead guilty Monday to drug-delivery charges involving three separate cases. Smallwood was sentenced to a total of 15 years in the ADC.

Clifton Lee Nash, 57, of Delight, plead guilty to possession of a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia. Nash will return to court Dec. 9 for formal sentencing, which was determined in court Monday to be five years in the ADC with three years suspended.

Jason Lavar Stewart, 47, of Murfreesboro, plead guilty Monday to charges of theft of property and "true" to violating the terms of his probation. Stewart was sentenced to four years with two years suspended on the drug charge and four years on the probation charge.



#### Q: What precautions should I take during colder weather?


A: As winter approaches, it advisable to prepare for changes in the weather. Cold has an effect even on those of us in Arkansas, where temperatures at or near freezing can be considered extreme. Being aware of how your body reacts during this time of year can help you make plans to stay safe. Frostbite and hypothermia are

two of the most common cold weather-related conditions. Frostbite can occur when the skin is exposed to freezing temperatures. Hypothermia is when the body's core temperature drops below 95 degrees Fahrenheit. Both require immediate medical attention. Symptoms of frostbite include numbness or pain in the exposed

area of the body. Hypothermia

symptoms include confusion and shivering. Steps to take for these and other cold-related issues include wearing warm clothing in loose layers, keeping dry (the body loses heat more quickly when wet), covering your head and limiting the time spent outdoors. Older people, newborns and

those with chronic illnesses are among those at most risk in colder weather. Do not ignore symptoms of temperaturerelated conditions, particularly shivering, which is a sign that the body is losing heat. Contact your health care provider if you have questions about how to get ready for colder temperatures.



STATE CAPITOL WEEK IN REVIEW Senator Steve Crowell

LITTLE ROCK – The state Senate held its traditional organizational meeting to name its leaders and choose committee assignments.

Senator Bart Hester of Cave Springs (Benton County) had previously been elected President Pro Tempore of the Senate for the 95th General Assembly. On January 13, the first day of the 2025 legislative session, he will be officially installed. It will be his second term, and he will be the third senator in the modern era to serve two terms as the leader of the Senate.

Senator Jonathan Dismang of Searcy will be Senate co-chair of the Joint Budget Committee. During legislative sessions, Joint Budget and its subcommittees will review in detail all state government spending requests. All appropriations that authorize state government expenditures must be approved by Joint Budget.

Senator Dismang was elected President Pro Tempore during the 89th General Assembly, after the resignation of the incumbent President. He was then elected President Pro Tempore for the 90th and 91st General Assemblies.

Besides Senators Hester and Dismang, Senator William Norrell of Monticello was the only other senator in the modern era to be elected twice as President Pro Tem. He served from 1933 through 1936.

Senator Ben Gilmore of Crossett will be Senate co-chair of the Legislative Council. Senator Jim Petty of Van Buren will be Senate co-chair of the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee.

Council and Audit are two of the most important committees that meet in the interim between legislative sessions, monitoring the operations of state agencies and making sure appropriations are properly spent.

Senator Terry Rice of Waldron will be Senate co-chair of the Joint Performance Review Committee. Commonly referred to as JPR, it reviews the performance of programs and agencies. JPR can hold hearings on government operations initiated by citizens and has authority to investigate violations of election law, with authority to subpoena documents and records.

Senator Blake Johnson of Corning will be Majority Leader and Senator Breanne Davis of Russellville will be Majority Whip. Senator Greg Leding of Fayetteville will be Minority Leader and Senator Fred Love of Little Rock will be Minority Whip.

The Senate has nine standing committees that will review all proposed legislation filed during the session, depending on its subject matter. Senator Missy Irvin of Mountain View will chair the Public Health, Welfare and Labor Committee. Senator Jimmy Hickey, Jr., of Texarkana will chair the Revenue and Taxation

Senator Jane English of North Little Rock will chair the Education Committee and Senator Alan Clark of Lonsdale will chair the Judiciary Committee. Senator Ronald Caldwell of Wynne will chair the Agriculture, Forestry and

Economic Development Committee.

In addition to his duties as Majority Leader, Senator Blake Johnson will chair the Insurance and Commerce Committee. Senator Gary Stubblefield of Branch (Logan County) will chair the City, County and Local Affairs Committee and Senator Scott Flippo of Bull Shoals will chair the State Agencies and Governmental Affairs Committee. Senator Ricky Hill of Cabot will chair the Transportation, Technology and Legislative Affairs Committee.

Senator Jim Dotson of Bentonville will be Senate co-chair of the Joint Committee on Public Retirement and Social Security Programs. Senator Gilmore, the senate co-chair of Council, also will chair the Senate Interim Committee on Children and Youth. Senator Mark Johnson of Ferndale will be Senate co-chair of the Joint Energy Committee.

Senator Kim Hammer of Benton will chair the Efficiency Committee and Senator Davis, the Majority Whip, will chair the Senate Rules

#### **BUDGET CONSIDERATION**

The governor proposed a balanced budget for legislators to consider during the 2025 session when they set spending levels for state government agencies.

Arkansas operates under a balanced budget, but the governor's proposal is important because it outlines her spending priorities for Fiscal Year 2026. We are now in the middle of Fiscal Year 2025, which ends on June 30, 2025.

Under the governor's proposal, state government would grow 2.89 percent next fiscal year. The governor listed her priorities as education, maternal health, public safety and government

Next year all Arkansas students will be eligible for Education Freedom Accounts, which were created by the legislature in 2023 when it approved the LEARNS Act. The EFA program helps families pay tuition at private schools.

Because of high interest in the EFA program, the governor said, her budget proposal includes \$90 million in additional funding to accommodate new students. Another \$90 million in one time "set aside" money would be available in case demand exceeds expectations.

\$2.5 billion. Institutions of higher education would receive \$777 million in state aid. About \$50 million would be added to the

The Public School Fund would be almost

budget of state prisons, bringing the total to about \$483 million.

The Department of Human Services (DHS) would receive almost \$1.9 billion in state funds. Its total budget is much larger because it receives federal matching funds. The agency's total budget is more than \$11 billion.

The Division of Youth Services would receive an increase in state funding of \$4.3 million, raising its budget to \$53.4 million.

Legislators questioned whether the Division



of Developmental Disabilities Services would get a budget increase. Administration officials said that employees within the division would qualify for raises under the governor's proposed

The governor has announced a proposed pay plan for state employees that would pay for salary increases for frontline

The governor's proposal includes \$13 million in new Medicaid funding to pay for improvements in maternal health care recommended by the Strategic Committee on Maternal Health. The division that administers Medicaid is slated to receive about \$1.4 billion in state funding. Federal funding accounts for about 71 percent of Medicaid spending in Arkansas, which totaled more than \$9 billion last fiscal year.

Under the state Constitution the legislature has ultimate authority to approve budgets for state government. Arkansas operates under a balanced budget law known as the Revenue Stabilization Act, which prioritizes state agency spending requests.

The state's general revenue budget comes mostly from sales taxes, individual income taxes and corporate income taxes. Under the governor's proposal, next year's general revenue budget will be an estimated \$6.8 billion, with a surplus of almost \$300 million



# The "real" night sky

During an evening event at a conference a few years ago in Fort Davis, Texas, an attendee was looking up at the stars and said "so this is what the Milky Way looks like". It was a stunning comment, but I realized that there are probably many people in the world who live under urban light domes and have never

seen the "real" night sky .Fort Davis, like other towns in that area, has been dark sky compliant for decades because of the proximity of the University

of Texas' McDonald Observatory. The Milky Way, discussed last week, is a beautiful sight, but much of its glory is dimmed if you are observing under the lights of a town or city. There are, however, places to go in Arkansas to get away from the lights. The Ouachita and Ozark National Forests, Cossatot River State Park, and the Buffalo River National Reserve offer good star gazing near us. Look up The Arkansas Natural Sky Association (ANSA) for information about all of the dark sky places in the state. If you want information about dark sky national and state parks, towns, and other sites in the U.S, or for international locations, go to the International Dark Sky's

ANSA's slogan, by the way, is "Protecting Arkansas' Other Diamonds".


