State Department of Transportation warns against toll-road scam

LITTLE ROCK -- On February 27, 2025, the Attorney General of Arkansas office alerted Arkansans to a resurfacing scam targeting mobile phone users through fraudulent text messages. Those behind the text messages are posing as toll service providers to steal personal information and trick recipients into making fake payments.

According to the Attorney General of Arkansas office, this scam, first seen in Arkansas in 2024, is making a comeback. The messages claim the recipient owes unpaid toll fees and provides a link for payment. However, Arkansas does not have toll roads, making these messages fraudulent.

"If you get one of these texts, please fill out the robocall reporting form on my website, and do not send payment to any entity that only contacts you via text," Attorney General Tim Griffin said.

GLENWOOD -- The Caddo River was recently featured as one of the best floating rivers in Arkansas in an article posted on www.arkansas.com.

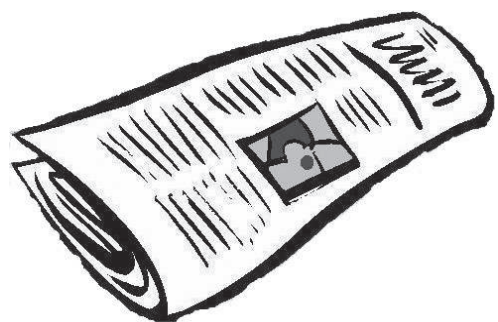
Arkansas is known for its outstanding outdoor activities and floating a river is one of the best ways to enjoy the outdoors in Arkansas.

Arkansas.com recently highlighted seven rivers that offer some of the best floating experiences in the state. The Caddo River, which makes its way through Clark, Montgomery and Pike Counties, made the list of rivers to float.

The Caddo River originates in the Ouachita mountains in Montgomery County. It flows into Pike County and Clark County before emptying into DeGray Lake in Arkadelphia. It ends its journey at the Ouachita River north of Arkadelphia.

The Caddo River is known as a floating destination with several local businesses catering to the kayaking and canoeing enthusiast. The river is also known as a great spot for fishing with smallmouth and spotted bass, longear and green sunfish among the fish many look

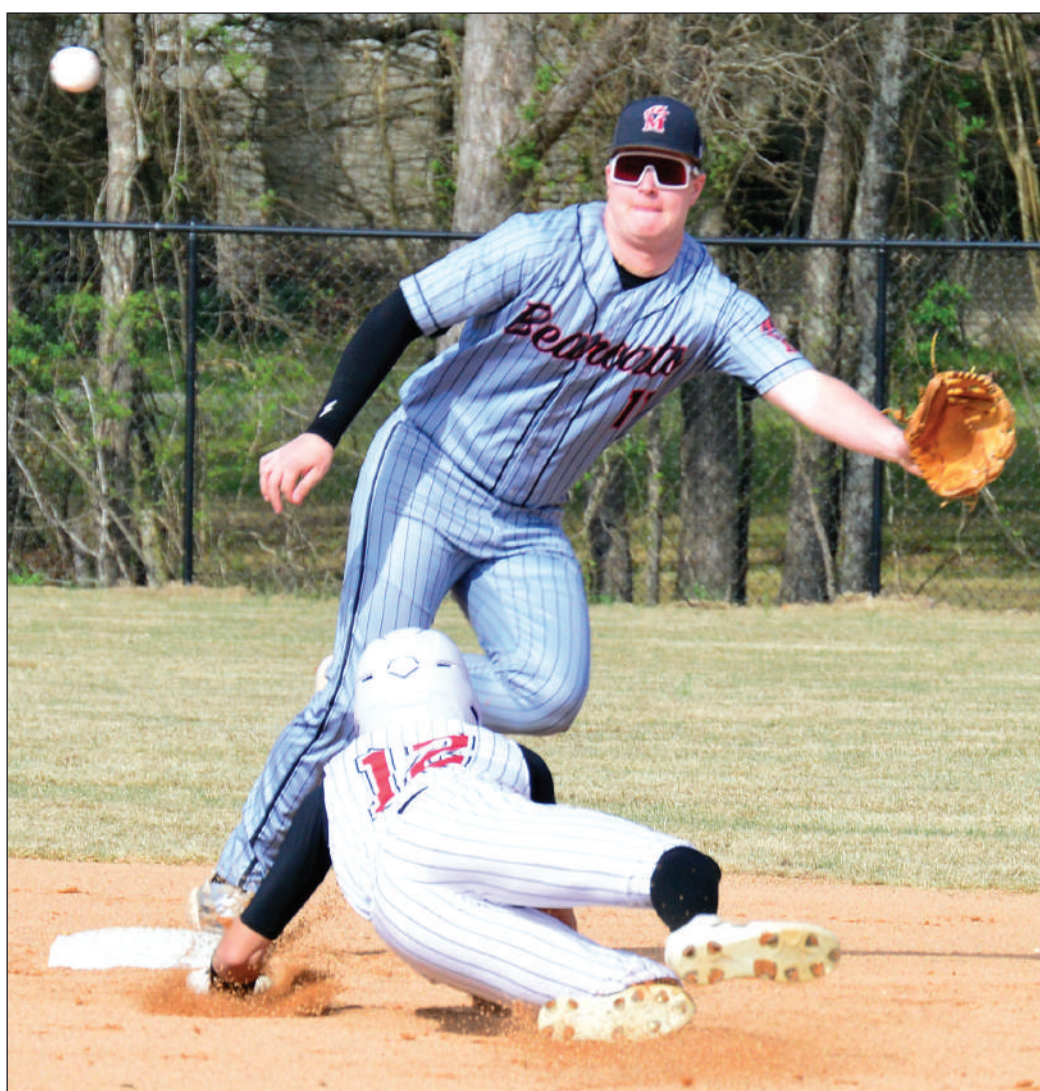

Local charged with child abuse material

ARKADELPHIA -- An Amity man has been charged in Clark County with 50 counts of possessing child sexual abuse material (CSAM).

James Virgil Parks, 38, who resides on Mountain Road in Amity, was charged March 27 in Clark County Circuit Court.

According to case information, an investigation was opened on Feb. 6 when a special agent with the Arkansas State Police was assigned a "cyber tip" associated with three CSAM incidents dated July 2024 and January 2025. The incidents were reported to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Chil-

dren by Snapchat and Kik, both mobile messaging apps.

A subpoena was issued during the investigation for an IP address, which came back to a "Michael Parks" on Mountain Road in Amity.

On Feb. 11, agents with the ASP Internet Crimes Against Children Taskforce executed a residential search warrant on Mountain Road. Agents found a cell phone in a spare room that had been destroyed and was collected as evidence.

Parks is still being held in the Clark County jail awaiting a trial date.

registered voters in the county. This number includes 851 yellow confirmation cards and 492 green cancellation cards.

As we approach the 2026 preferential primary and general elections, it is important that you update your voter registration with our office. Please fill out the detachable postcard and mail it back and we will update your registration information. This is a vital step to ensure that your voter registration stays current and avoid the possibility of being removed as a Pike County voter due to non-compliance with the law.

NVRA BACKGROUND

The National Voter Registration Act (NVRA) of 1993 set up national guidelines and requirements for allowing voters to be given the opportunity to register to vote or change their voter registration information when seeking or receiving services such as a driver's license or public assistance.

Under the law (Amend 51, §10, (d)), the Pike County Clerk's Voter Registration Office is to conduct bi-annual confirmation mailings to those individuals with whom we didn't have contact during the past two general election cycles. These individuals didn't vote nor update their registration information during the cycle. The mailing asks the voter to either confirm their address or update their registration information. A postcard is built into the mailer, which enables the voter to mail back their response to the Voter Registration Office.

OFFICIAL VOTER MAILOUTS ... Pike County Clerk Rande Edwards advises that any Pike County residents that are registered voters to not consider either of the below forms to be considered as junk mail. Returning the cards is vital to remaining a registered voter.

for in the river. For the floating enthusiast, the Caddo River offers something for everyone. Known as an easygoing float, the Caddo River is perfect for a summer afternoon of meandering on the water and enjoying the beautiful scenery along the way. Floating season isn't limited to the Summer with many floating the river throughout the year. The Caddo River does offer Class I and II rapids along the way, offering enough of a challenge to attract even the most seasoned kayaker and canoer. The Ouachita River, which runs through Montgomery County, winds its way approximately 177 miles through Arkansas. The river begins its journey near Mena, Arkansas and makes its way through Montgomery County before feeding into Lake Ouachi-

ta. The river continues southward through Arkansas and into Louisiana where it joins the Tensas River to form the Black River near Jonesville, Louisiana. The Ouachita River is known as a river that can offer a challenge no matter where you put in. The upper portion of the river, which runs through Montgomery County, features clear water that tumble along shoals before emptying into tranquil pools. The scenery as it weaves its way through the Ouachita Mountains is breathtaking. Where does the earth end and the sky begin?

What is the distance between the Earth and the sky? Basically, the answer is zero. The Earth's atmosphere is sky, where we find birds in flight, clouds at different levels, from fog to cirrus, and the ever-present aircraft. Those who think of the sky as the dome of stars, and where the Sun, the Moon and the planets reside are thinking of space.

Not surprisingly, our modern age has an internationally agreed upon definition of where the boundary between Earth's atmosphere and space is. It is called the Von Karman Line, and to get there it would require a vertical trip of 62 miles. It sounds like an easy enough trip; in your car you could be there in less than an hour. However, your vehicle would have to be modified to produce enough energy to accelerate to about 17,500 miles per hour to counter the pull of Earth's gravity (if you wanted to go into orbit).

I recall a scene from the movie "The Right Stuff" when test pilot Chuck Yeager (of breaking the sound barrier fame) takes an experimental fighter jet straight up almost to the boundary. He could see the curvature of the Earth, the blue sky faded away, and the blackness of space appeared, full of stars, before the nose of the jet tipped back toward Earth.

Spring and summer are good times of the year to watch clouds. Spring offers a variety of clouds, from puffy cumulus to the lingering high-altitude cirrus, as well as the stormy ones. Summer is seemingly dominated by cumulus (cotton ball) clouds.

There is a human tendency, when looking at clouds, to see familiar shapes in them like faces, rabbits, dragons etc. Pareidolia is the name for the tendency to see such images in unrelated objects like rock formations, gnarly wood and, as mentioned, clouds. Famous ones are the face of the Virgin Mary on a piece of toast, the man or rabbit in the Moon, and the face of the Devil in the smoke from the Twin Towers on 9-11.

Astronomers also have exercised Pareidolia by giving nebulae names that describe what they look like. You can find a bat, a tarantula, a cat's eye, a horsehead and an eagle out there in deep-space, just to mention a few.

Q: What is celiac disease?

A: Celiac disease is a chronic digestive system disorder caused by an abnormal reaction to foods containing gluten, a protein found in grains such as barley, rye or wheat. The gluten triggers an immune response that ultimately damages the small intestine. The National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases estimates that celiac disease affects about 2 million people in the U.S.

Those affected by celiac disease are more likely to have nutritional deficiencies because the mucosa, the lining in the small intestine, is unable to properly absorb nutrients. Those with autoimmune diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis or Type 1 diabetes are more at risk for celiac disease. The condition frequently presents itself during early childhood or between the ages of 40 and 60. Celiac disease symptoms are similar to other illnesses. Bloating, constipation, diarrhea, nausea and vomiting, and weight loss are common symptoms. Complications include anemia, loss of bone density, liver damage, delayed puberty and damage to tooth enamel. A gluten-free diet is the primary treatment for celiac disease. This allows the small intestine to heal and resume normal function. Iron or vitamin supplements may be recommended to aid with nutritional deficiencies. Tags needed to bag a turkey this spring, nonresidents limited to single gobbler

LITTLE ROCK -- Arkansas turkey hunters will need to add one more item to their hunting vest this season: an Arkansas Turkey Hunting Tag. The tags and a valid hunting license are required to enable the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission to more accurately judge the number of hunters taking to the field in the search of a gobbler.

The resident versions of the turkey tags, labelled RTT for adults and YTT for youth hunters, are free but must be acquired through the AGFC's licensing system before the hunter takes to the woods. Even residents who hold lifetime licenses and disability licenses are required to add this free permit to their licensing account before hunting. Checking out the tags will enable all resident hunters a total of two legal gobblers.

Nonresidents have a few more hoops than resident hunters to jump through if they wish to chase an Arkansas turkey. For non-resident hunters under 16, the Nonresident Youth Turkey Tag remains free and will be the only license they need. Adult hunters, on the other hand, will need to either purchase a Nonresident Turkey Tag (NRTT) for \$100 in addition to their Nonresident Annual Hunting License (NBG), which costs \$410, or they may opt for the newly created Nonresident Annual Turkey Hunting License (NRTL), which includes a tag, for \$325.

"Many hunters who chase turkeys in Arkansas may not have an annual license from last deer season, so we wanted to offer this \$325 license as a more affordable option for nonresidents wanting to pursue turkeys in Arkansas," Brad Carner, deputy director of the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission, said. "If you already hunt deer here, you can just buy the \$100 tag to add to your annual license as well. Whichever way is more economical will work."

Nonresidents who hold a Non-expiring Lifetime Hunting and Fishing Permit from their time as residents in Arkansas will still need to get the Nonresident Turkey Tag in the license system, but will not be charged the \$100 fee when they check out of the

system.

Regardless of the license, all nonresidents will need to choose wisely this spring, as all nonresident options are limited to a single legal turkey per year.

"The Commission has heard from many hunters through the regulations public comment process as well as during informal conversations about the idea of reducing bag limits for turkeys to one per year in order to preserve hunt quality and protect Arkansas's turkey flock," Carner said. "Although very few hunters actually harvest two birds, the Commission did decide to opt for a more conservative limit on nonresidents after many discussions."

According to Susan Porter, AGFC licensing manager, one additional turkey tag option may appear in Arkansas's license system for some hunters. The code NBLTP represents another free turkey tag, this one specifically for Mississippi residents who are hunting land that falls under the Arkansas/Mississippi reciprocal agreement.

"They will need to have all licenses required to hunt in Mississippi, but some of these lands are on the Arkansas side of the Mississippi River, so they will need to get this free turkey tag to transport their bird back across state lines to check it with Mississippi's license system," Porter said. "That is the only scenario where a hunter in Arkansas would need this particular tag on their license profile."

Arkansas's turkey season opens April 21 statewide. In Turkey Zone 1, it closes April 29; it continues through May 11 in Turkey Zone 2. The Special Youth Turkey Hunt for hunters younger than 16 is April 12-13. A full list of turkey regulations is available in the 2024-25 Arkansas Hunting Guidebook.

All turkeys harvested in Arkansas must be checked via agfc.com, the AGFC mobile app or by phone within 12 hours of harvest. If they are checked immediately upon harvest, the turkey does not need a physical tag attached to it. If the hunter is unable

to immediately check the bird, then they must affix a possession tag indicating the hunter's name, CID number and the date and time of harvest that must remain with the bird until it is checked. Checking should also be more convenient this season, as the AGFC plans to roll out a new "express check" option on its website beginning with the Special Youth Turkey Hunt. Visit www.agfc.com/licenses to procure your turkey tag.

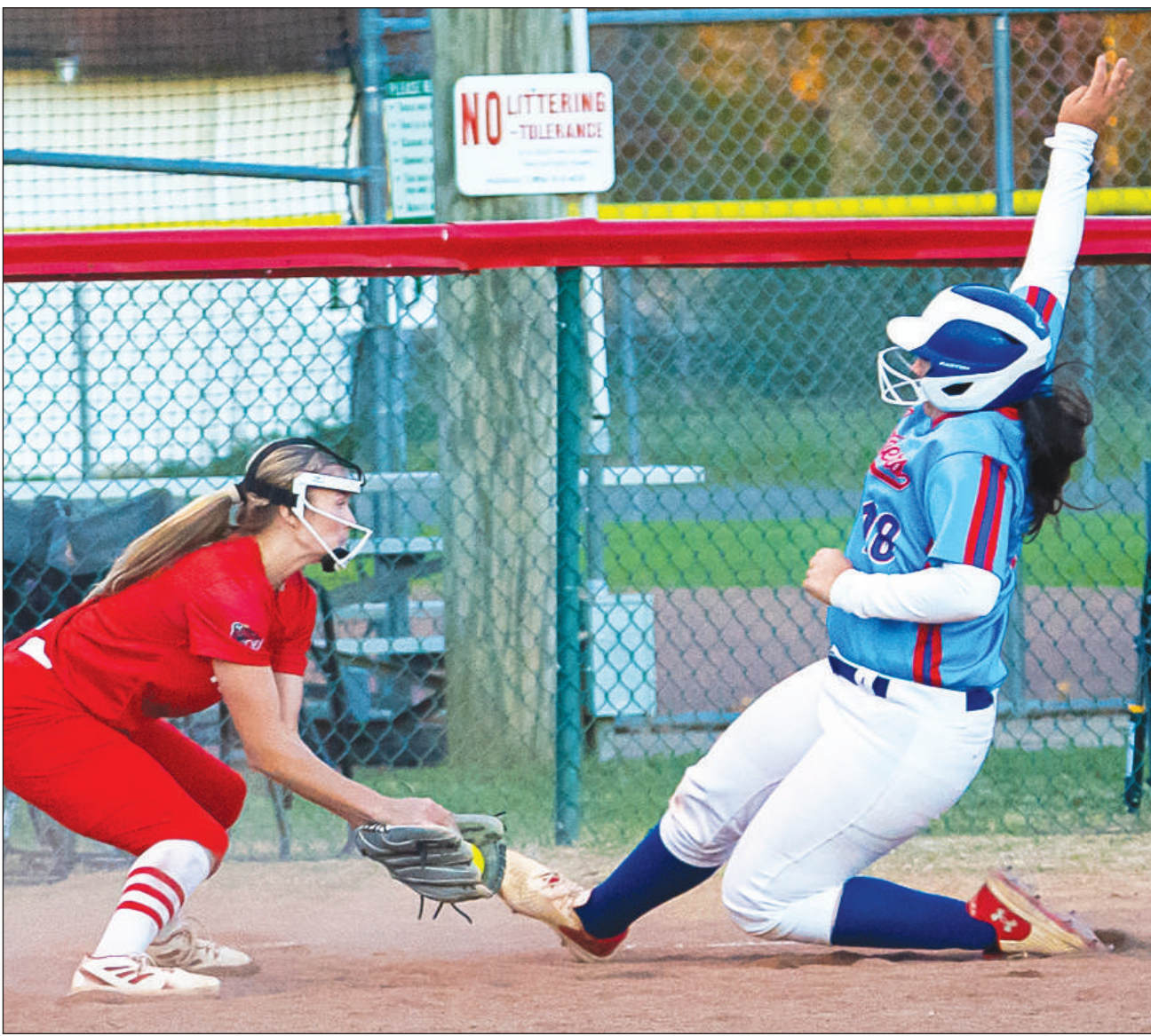
