Kirby VFD benefit bass tournament announced

SELF CREEK LANDING -- The first Kirby Volunteer Fire Department bass tournament will be held on Saturday, May 17 at the Self Creek boat ramp on Lake Greeson.

The event will be held from 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. with an entry free of 100 per boat. AGFC regulations will be enforced.

The tournament will be held in the Major League Fishing style with weigh-ins of 20 fish per boat. The fish must be black/Kentucky bass only.

Entries may be comprised of two adults and one youth, one adult and two youth or two adults with kids being defined as 13 years or younger.

Boats with youth are eligible to receive extra prizes.

Weigh ins will be at 11 a.m. (30 minute weigh-in) and at 3:30 p.m.

Entry for takeoff will be determined at a drawing the morning of the tournament.

Local man charged with murder seeks second mental evaluation

MURFREESBORO -- A former Howard County jailer charged in Pike County for the 2024 shooting death of a Delight man will undergo a second mental evaluation before his case can proceed.

Christian Marc Buster, 29, who resides in Pike County, was charged May 30, 2024 for the death of Oscar Alba, 34, of Delight. In court Monday, Buster was arraigned on an amended charge of first-degree with a weapon enhancement and plead innocent.

An Aug. 4 pretrial case was set by Ninth West Judicial Circuit Judge Tom Cooper and a second mental evaluation "to include criminal responsibility" was approved for the defendant. Buster's previous mental evaluation deemed him fit to proceed with his case.

Buster has been held at the Pike County jail on a \$500,000 bond since his arrest on April 27, 2024.

Buster is a former employee of the Howard County Sheriff's Department where he had worked as a jailer for approximately seven months, according to information from the Howard County Courthouse. Buster was terminated from his job the Monday following his arrest.

The Arkansas State Police investigated the shooting and were called in by Pike County authorities the morning of April 27 to Buster's home at 1152 Highway 26 East. A search warrant was executed at the crime scene at approximately 8:30 a.m.

Alba's fiancée Lacey Hampton, who reportedly witnessed the shooting, told investigators that she, Alba and Buster had been drinking the night before and they had given Buster a ride to his home in Buster's vehicle when the shooting happened. Hampton alleged Buster retrieved a pistol from the vehicle's center console and exited the vehicle and began firing at Alba.

Once Alba fell to the ground, court records state Buster immediately began administering CPR life-saving efforts and also told his mother to call 911. The weapon, a 9mm, was fired at least three times and two bullets apparently struck Alba in the chest.

Buster said in a later interview that he fired the weapon in self defense because he felt threatened by Alba and Hampton and claimed the couple had abused him and were holding him against his will. Investigators noted Buster exhibited no physical injuries on his face or body.

Also in court Monday, Derek Abernathy, 46, of Hot Springs, plead guilty to conspiracy to deliver methamphetamine. He was sentenced to eight years in the Arkansas Department of Correction with two years suspended.

Pair sentenced for 220 years for child abuse materials

MURFREESBORO -- On Monday, April 21, Ninth West Judicial Circuit Judge Tom Cooper sentenced two Pike County men, including a former preacher, to a total of 220 of years in prison after they plead guilty to felony charges involving child sexual abuse material.

James Vincent Henry, 43, who's last address was in Delight but court records list his home in Gravette, plead guilty to 11 counts of distributing, possessing or viewing matter depicting sexually explicit conduct involving a child. Judge Cooper sentenced Henry to 10 years on each count for a total of 110 years in the Arkansas Department of Corrections (ADC). The sentences will run consecutively.

Henry, who served as preacher at Crossroads Assembly of God Church in Delight prior to his arrest, was originally charged with 100 counts and was arrested Oct. 15, 2024. He has remained in county custody since then on \$50,000 bond.

Henry was officially charged with 20 counts on Nov. 15, 2024, but on Monday the court opted not to pursue nine of those charges as part of Henry's plea deal.

According to an affidavit prepared by Special Agent Christopher Harper with the Arkansas State Police, an investigation involving Henry began in August 2024 when Harper was assigned two "cyber tip" reports from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children. The reports involved the uploading of CSAM (child sexual abuse material) using Kik and Snapchat messaging applications.

The material was uploaded from an account belonging to Henry and his official church email address was used.

The state police investigator was able to determine that the one IP addresses involved in the CSAM was assigned to Henry at his Cherry Street home in Delight and that another address was assigned to Crossroads Assembly of God Church.

A residential search warrant was executed at the Henry home on Sept. 25 and numerous electronic devices were seized. Henry was then

escorted to the church where more electronic devices were seized.

An extraction of one of Henry's phone showed his phone number was allegedly associated with the CSAM and several photos were recovered. Another phone, owned by Henry's wife, Brittney, was also extracted and showed she made numerous calls and sent numerous messages to and from the phone number at the center of the investigation. Henry's phone number was labeled "vacation phone" in his wife's phone contacts.

Brittney Henry has not been arrested or charged in connection with this case.

According to the Delight church's website at the time of Henry's arrest, Henry is original from Dumas and he has served as youth pastor at Assembly of God churches in Lacey, McGee and Mountain Pine, as well as Newsong Church in Centerton, where he served on the "media team."

The website also states the Henrys served as foster parents for New Beginnings Children's Home in Centerton and they were foster parents to 76 children in four years before they moved to the "transitional living program for young ladies 18-25" for two years.

Also on Monday, Judge Cooper sentenced Roy M. Oleyte, 47, of Glenwood, under the same conditions as the Henry case and he plead guilty to 11 of 20 counts of distributing, possessing or viewing matter depicting sexually explicit conduct involving a child. Oleyte was sentenced to 110 consecutive years in the ADC.

Oleyte was arrested and booked at the Pike County jail on Oct. 29, 2024 and he has been in county custody with \$100,000 since his arrest. He was officially charged on Nov. 15, 2024.

Oleyte was using BitTorrent to download child pornography.

A search warrant was executed at the defendant's Lakeshore Street apartment on Oct. 29 and his phone was seized. A forensic search found child sexual abuse material and a further evaluation of the phone resulted in the number of criminal counts to increase to 20.

Preparing for canning season -- get ready now for a safe and successful harvest

MURFREESBORO -- Whether you're a seasoned canner or trying it for the first time, now is the perfect time to get ready. Preparing ahead ensures you'll be able to preserve your harvest safely and efficiently when the fruits and vegetables are at their peak.

First, check your equipment early. Safe, high-quality home-canned food starts with the right tools in good working condition. Don't wait until the tomatoes are ripe or the cucumbers are overflowing—check your equipment now so you're not caught off guard.

• **PRESSURE CANNERS** are essential for preserving low-acid foods, including: Vegetables (like green beans or corn), meats, poultry and fish. There are two types of pressure canners.

• **DIAL GAUGE CANNERS** show the pressure inside with a dial and must be tested annually for accuracy.

• **WEIGHTED GAUGE CANNERS** Use weights to control pressure and do not require annual testing. If you have a dial gauge canner, schedule a test with the Pike County Extension Office at 870-285-2161 to ensure it's calibrated properly before use.

• **BOILING WATER CANNERS** are for high-acid foods, like fruits, jams and jellies, and pickles. Make sure yours is deep enough to cover jars with 1-2 inches of water, has a flat bottom to sit evenly on your stovetop and includes a rack to lift jars off the bottom.

• A **STEAM CANNER** is a new method of canning food. It is a three-piece vessel that includes a water basin, jar rack, and lid with temperature gauge. Updated research supports that a steam canner can be safely used in place of a boiling water bath canner for many high acid foods but cannot be used in place of pressure canning for low acid foods. Only high acid foods (pH of 4.6 or lower) can be processed safely in steam canners. These include fruits, jams, jellies, some tomato products, pickled products, and other fruit preserves. Only use recipes that have been research-tested as safe for use with steam canning such as those from USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning, the National Center for Home Food Preservation, and the book So Easy to Preserve. The recipe processing time cannot exceed 45 minutes. This limitation is due to length of time the water in the reservoir can provide adequate steam without running dry. The processing time in a steam canner is the same as listed for a boiling water bath canner in tested recipes. Follow instructions for adjusting for elevation. Steam canners must be calibrated for the location of use. Follow the manufacturer's instructions. Research recommendations only apply to Back-to-Basics and Victorio steam canner models. One of the benefits of steam canners is that they require less water and thus use less energy per batch. Less water also means less weight on the stove top and it is easier to move once processing is finished.

Strawberries are getting ready to pick and here is a recipe to kick off the season! Enjoy!

11/2 quarts stemmed, firm, red, ripe strawberries

5 cups sugar
1/3 cup bottled lemon juice (not fresh lemon juice)
Berries with hollow cores should not be used. Combine strawberries and sugar; let stand 3-4 hours refrigerated.
Sterilize canning jars since the processing time is less than 10 minutes.
Bring berries and sugar slowly to boiling, stirring occasionally until sugar dissolves. Add lemon juice. Cook rapidly until berries are clear and syrup thick, about 10-12 minutes. Pour into a shallow pan. Let stand uncovered 12-24 hours in refrigerator. Shake pan occasionally to distribute berries through syr-

up. Heat mixture and pour hot preserves into hot, sterilized jars, leaving ¼ inch headspace. Wipe jar rims and adjust lids to finger-tight. Process 5 minutes in a **BOILING WATER BATH**. Remove canner lid. Wait 5 minutes before moving jars. Using a jar lifter, remove the jars one at a time, being careful not to tilt the jars. Carefully place the hot jars right side up directly onto dry towels to prevent the jars from breaking on contact with a cold surface, leaving at least 1 inch of space between the jars during cooling. Let the jars sit undisturbed while they cool, from 12-24 hours.

Senior high Rattlers compete at Leopard Relays

Baseball, softball seasons begin to wind down

MURFREESBORO – The Murfreesboro Rattlers baseball team opened last week with a 14-8 loss to Bismarck at home on Tuesday, April 15.

Bismarck would jump out to a 13-0 lead through two and a half innings before the Rattlers rallied for three runs in the bottom of the third.

Hunter Cox would start on the mound for Murfreesboro, allowing four hits, two walks and three runs without the Rattlers recording an out.

Brody Maroon was 2/3 for MHS with a home run as part of his two RBIs, one run game.

Carter Gilmer had a double, stole a base and scored twice for the Rattlers, while Isaac Kuykendall and Alex Bonner each added a pair of RBIs for the team.

Blake Cranford (3/3, double, four runs, two RBIs) and Trey Smith (4/4, three runs, two RBIs) led the Lions on their offensive output.

MOUNT IDA
On Thursday, the Rattlers returned to their winning ways with an 11-4 victory over the visiting Mount Ida Lions.

The Rattlers would jump out to a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the first and would rally for three runs in the bottom of third after Mount Ida took a 3-2 lead in the top of the third.

The game remained close until the bottom of the sixth, when MHS would plate five runs and close out any remaining drama.

Laytan Wilcher would double twice and steal three bases in the game for the Rattlers, resulting in an RBI and three runs scored. He would also control the game from the mound, going 5.67 innings while allowing zero earned runs, five hits and three walks while striking out eight.

Kooper Caldwell would drive in four runs, score once and steal a base on his 3/3 day. Maroon added a double and a pair of RBIs, and Kuykendall had a triple and two RBIs.

Landon Gadberry had a pair of hits – one of which was a double – and added a run and an RBI to lead Mount Ida.

DIERKS
The Rattlers would notch another win the next day with a 12-2 victory at home over the Dierks Outlaws.

After going down 1-0 in the first half of the first inning, MHS would plate 11 runs combined in the home half of the first and second innings to take a commanding lead.

Caldwell again drove in four runs in the game, this time hitting a home run and scoring twice.

Lathan Compton (double), Gilmer (stolen base) and Kuykendall (triple, two runs scored) each added a pair of RBIs for the Rattlers.

Bonner would also double and drive in a run for the Rattlers. Starting pitcher Maroon pitched a complete game of five innings in allowing four hits, two earned runs and four walks while striking out eight batters. He would also add a double and a run scored on the offensive end.

Treaton Alexander started the game for Dierks, slogging through two innings while allowing 10 hits, eight earned runs and four walks, while striking out three batters.

Kolton Gadbury would steal a base and drive in a run for the Outlaws, while teammate Jordan Hill stole a base and scored a run.

Murfreesboro now sits at 15-7 overall and 9-1 in conference with two weeks remaining in the regular season, and will host Foreman on Monday and travel to Horatio on Friday. A large game potentially looms on May 2 when the team will travel to Spring Hill to face the Bears, who are currently 12-5 and 99-1, giving MHS their only conference loss to date on April 7 in a 10-8 win.

Sky smile to be slightly offset

There have been some internet and Facebook postings recently announcing a rare astronomical event created by the waning Crescent Moon and the planets Venus and Saturn.

Unfortunately, a few sites have an image of an enlarged Moon under the two planets making a large grinning smiley face. This conjunction will in fact occur as stated on Friday, April 25 in the pre-dawn eastern horizon. However, the Crescent Moon will not be a smile as big as the Alice in Wonderland Cheshire Cat’s, and the alignment will be somewhat askew with the shiny side of the Moon turned and to the left of the two planets.

It will still be an interesting sight. Be sure to go to a place where you have an open view of the eastern sky because the scene will be low on the horizon.

There are a couple of smiley faces that come around every year created by the visual alignment of stars. One of them is in the constellation Cygnus the Swan (or Northern Cross). Cygnus can be seen in the eastern sky after midnight in the spring, and by July it is almost overhead by 9 p.m.

This smiley face has been recognized for a while and even has a fancy name, Vultus Irrisorie, from the Latin meaning a scoffing or mocking facial expression. To me it Is more like the Cheshire Cat smile (which some would say is mocking). You will need binoculars to see the seven or so stars of the face. It is located on the right side of the cross shape, and it will take a little searching to find, but when you do it will make you smile.

The other starry smiley face is in the constellation Auriga near the star cluster M 38. I have not seen this one, but plan to do so in June when it is higher in the evening sky.

Q: What is the role of a physician assistant?

A: A physician assistant (PA) is a licensed health care professional who provides direct patient care under the supervision of a medical doctor. Physician assistants may perform either general health care or work in a variety of specialty fields. They are a key component of health care, particularly in areas underserved by doctors.

The main difference between a physician assistant and a doctor is the level of education and training. Doctors graduate from medical school and then must complete a residency program. PAs must complete a master’s degree from an accredited PA program and then pass the Physician Assistant National Certifying Examination. They must also complete state-specific licensing requirements.

PAs may assist with surgeries, develop treatment plans, prescribe certain medications, perform physical examinations and conduct research. They work in a range of health care settings, including community health centers, educational facilities, hospitals, outpatient clinics and physicians’ offices.

Many patients are treated by PAs, particularly for routine illnesses or injuries. The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates that the PA field will grow by 28% by 2033, so the demand is high.

Drug take back event set for Saturday at PCSO

MURFREESBORO -- The National DEA Drug Take Back event is scheduled for April 26 from 10:00 a.m.-2 p.m.

The Pike County Sheriff's Office, located at 305 Industrial Park Drive, Murfreesboro, will serve as the drop-off location for unused medications.

In a submitted press release from Qualchoice Insurance, some advice was given toward the event.

- Do your part to help reduce drug abuse. DEA reports that prescription drug and opioid addiction is a growing problem across the U.S. Removing unused medicines from your home and returning them at a collection site can help prevent this problem. Prescription drug abuse can cause medical emergencies and deadly overdoses, so it is critical to limit access to these medications.
- Don't let a poisoning accident happen. Poisonings from prescription and over-the-counter medicines are on the rise, and it is essential to dispose of them properly. Leaving unused prescription, over-the-counter and pet medicines unattended in the home can endanger children, senior citizens and pets. Be sure to find a drug take-back site and dispose of them properly to prevent any accidental poisonings.
- Do take the opportunity to protect the environment. According to recent studies, medicines that are not on the FDA's flush list can contaminate lakes and streams, which is harmful for fish and other wildlife, and also end up in drinking water when flushed down the drain. Many drug collection organizations incinerate unused medicines, so getting rid of these medications at a take-back site is the best way to dispose of them without negatively impacting the environment.
- Don't take back unapproved items. Make sure you only return unused items that are approved by DEA. Prescription medications, over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, pet medicines, medicated ointments or lotions and medicine samples are just a few examples of items that are safe to return at a collection site. Items you should not take include needles or syringes, thermometers, aerosol cans, empty containers, infectious or business waste and other non-medicine-related items.

Take-back sites vary by state, so visit dea.gov/takebackday to find collection sites in Arkansas and view more resources for safely getting rid of unused prescriptions and other medicines. More information about drug take-

ORDINANCE NO. 2025-1

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY RECORDER/TREASURER TO EXECUTE AN INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH PIKE COUNTY, ARKANSAS FOR PERSONNEL EXPENSES OF THE PIKE COUNTY DISTRICT COURT

WHEREAS, the City of Murfreesboro, Arkansas is a municipal corporation duly incorporated, organized and existing under the laws of the State of Arkansas and a city of the second (2nd) class; and,

WHEREAS, the City has all powers that the constitutions, statutes, and common law of the United States and State of Arkansas expressly or impliedly grant or allow a city; and

WHEREAS, ACA §14-54-101 allows a City to enter into an Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the District Court adjudicates cases arising in Pike County, Arkansas, jurisdiction outside the city limits of the City of Murfreesboro, Arkansas, as well as adjudicating cases arising within the city limits and jurisdiction of the City of Murfreesboro, Arkansas and;

WHEREAS, the City of Murfreesboro and the County currently have a working arrangement for paying the District Court Personnel their salaries, insurance benefits, fringe benefits and retirement contributions (“District Court Personal Services Expense”) between the parties; and,

WHEREAS, the City and County both agree that the custom and practice of splitting the costs of the District Court Personal Services Expenses with ½ of said expenses being paid by the County and ¼ of said expenses being paid by the City; and

WHEREAS, the City and County both agree that the provisions of this Agreement are retro-active to include the entire District Court Personal Services Expense for calendar year 2025.

WHEREAS, the proposed Interlocal Agreement is attached as Exhibit A to this Ordinance and incorporated herein by reference; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed, approved and agreed to enter into an Interlocal Agreement with Pike County, Arkansas, on the personnel service expenses of the Pike County District Court by passage of this Ordinance as required by ACA §14-14-910(b)(2) regarding permanent or perpetual relationships between parties in an interlocal agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MURFREESBORO, ARKANSAS, OF THE FOLLOWING:

SECTION 1: The City Council hereby approves the Interlocal Agreement attached as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference to this Section of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2: The Mayor and City Recorder/Treasurer are hereby authorized to sign and execute a copy of the Interlocal Agreement between the City of Murfreesboro, Arkansas and Pike County, Arkansas for the personnel expenses of the Pike County District Court as attached and as further described with this Ordinance and incorporated in this Ordinance by reference.

SECTION 3: The declaration of any part of this ordinance to be invalid shall not serve to void any other part of the ordinance.

SECTION 4: Any prior ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5: This ordinance being necessary for the preservation of the health safety and welfare of the residents of the City of Murfreesboro, Pike County, Arkansas; therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage.
