Local VFD participates in fire boat training

LAKE DEGRAY - Joplin volunteer Fire Department and Murfreesboro Volunteer Fire Department were among the 34 fire boat crews and departments who participated in the 2016 Arkansas Fire Boat School.

This marked the 13th year for the fire boat training event, which was held Saturday, June 4, at DeGray Lake near Arkadelphia. The training event allows fire boat crews to train under realistic conditions.

Large boat and small boat crews participated in a series of scenarios designed to prepare them for a variety of situations. Scenarios included wildland fire scenario, medical scenario with victims in a boat prop, plane crash with a simulated fire, boat de-watering, tanker refill, and a defensive driving serpentine course.

The scenarios are designed by leaders in emergency response from various federal, state and local organizations. Groups involved include: Arkansas Forestry Commission, Arkansas Game & Fish Commission, Arkansas Fire Academy, LifeNet, Air Evac, and a host of fire departments from across the state.

Some scenarios involved volunteers serving as “crash victims.” Some of the victims wore make up and prosthetics to simulate injuries.

**123 years ago: 1893**

A heavy storm accompanied by one of the hardest rains and some of the biggest hail on record passed over this section Tuesday evening. County Judge Beauchamp says his entire crop is a loss. Between this place and Corinth the damage is very great. Fences are gone and acres of the ground is washed away.

The worst of the storm seems to have been about Centre Point. The fronts were blown off the stores of Ansley & Bro., Cannon & Owens and John A. Hughes. The Baptist church was completely wrecked and a Negro man named Tom Haller who was in the building was killed. The residence of Mr. J.J. Stuart, county assessor, was struck by lightning, and his wife and three children were knocked down and remained insensible for several minutes.

The supreme court of Arkansas today affirmed the verdict of the Howard County circuit court, in

the case of Parker Hunter, convicted with Walter Manasco, for the murder of Tip Patterson, of Umpire and sentenced to the penitentiary.

Berry Spring, Jr. received serious injuries in an accident at Centre Point Sunday. A horse he was riding ran away with him, colliding with a buggy. A wheel of the vehicle was wrecked, and a young lady who was seated in it was considerably bruised, while Springs was unconscious for some time.

## Drug-related trial set July 11-12 in criminal court

A defendant facing three drug-related felo-ny charges rejected the state’s plea bargain offer last Wednesday, June 1, and two days have been set aside in July for his criminal trial.  
Channing Matrelle Har-ris, 24, black male, Mineral Springs, was originally charged in October of 2015 with a pair of class D felo-nies -- possession of Sched-ule VI controlled substance with purpose of delivery, and possession of drug paraphernalia, and a class Y felony, simultaneous possession of drugs and firearms.  
July 11 and 12 have been set for jury selection and the trial. Pretrial motions will be heard June 22.  
On the bench here last Wednesday was Judge Charles Yeargan.  
One defendant is still in evaluation for drug court program and will make a formal plea June 20 if she meets the requirements. The sentencing will take place on regular court day in Pike County for Wendy Kinkade, 30, white female,, Nashville, who is charged with controlled substance fraudulent practices, a class D felony.  
Four defendants plead-ed not guilty and had trial dates set.  
Austin S. Dansby, 21, white male, who is listed as homeless, pleaded not guilty to a class C felony charge of accomplice to commercial burglary, and a misdemeanor charge of theft of property. An al-ternative public defender was appointed as his legal counsel.  
Bond was reduced to \$10,000 but he was cau-tioned not to leave the state. Pretrial motions will be heard Aug. 10.  
A trial date of July 26 was set for Paige J. Walker, 42, white female, Nash-ville, who is charged with class B felony maintain-ing a drug premises. She also faces other charges related to drug felonies. Pretrial motions will be heard July 6.  
A not guilty plea was given by Candy Collier, 27, white female, Nash-ville, charged with deliv-ery of methamphetamine or cocaine, class B felony. Pretrial motions will be heard Oct. 12.

## Love is a garden to be cultivated

June is the month of weddings and a time to celebrate that love. Whether you have been married for just a few months or for many years, love must be cultivated like a garden. Here are five things you can do to maintain a healthy relationship.

**Practice humility.** Psychology tells us that what we as humans tend to see is what we look for. If we look for offenses against us or if we look for selfishness or faults in a partner, we'll probably find it. If we look for graciousness, kindness and goodness, we'll probably find them. There is often a “hardening of categories” in marriage, meaning that people tend to see their partners in a certain way. Next they start to look for confirming evidence this is true and the cycle continues.

**Look for the good.** Take the time to notice the things our partners do that we appreciate, including the parts of our partner that inevitably, at times, will be inconvenient but that are still a blessing that we would chose.

**Speak your partner’s language of love.** Gary Chapman, author of the *Five Love Languages* series, points out that nothing you do to show love for you partner will be effective unless what you’re doing matters to your partner. Even though, Gifts, is one of the love languages, buying a diamond necklace doesn’t mean much to the person who has Quality Time, as their top love language. This person would much prefer to spend a quite night together watching a movie or taking a walk together. The key is to find out which language of love your partner has and then doing things to address that particular love language.



**Do maintenance.** John Gottman, one of the country’s foremost authorities in marriage research, says that a trip to Hawaii won’t heat up a relationship if you haven’t kept the pilot light lit. It isn’t the great big events that are the key to having a continuing healthy relationship.

Instead the little conversations, the spending 10 to 15 minutes a day to catch up on each other, the doing little things together, whether it’s working in the yard or painting a room or watching videos.

Little things done together regularly provide maintenance that’s very important.

**Foster companionship.** Jonathan Haidt, talks about the idea that in the early stages of a relationship the romance initially skyrockets and then starts to decline within a short period of time. For a relationship to continue, it’s important for people to evolve gracefully from the electric jolt of early romance to the sweet satisfaction of being with someone whose company is comforting.

Gottman recommends keeping a list of the qualities that we enjoy in our partner in a wallet, keeping photos of cherished times handy, or keeping a small scrapbook handy to page through every now and then and remind us of the good times and help us remember what we enjoyed about them in the first place. That is the key to a healthy relationship.

Whisk together dry ingredients, then stir in cheese. In a separate bowl, whisk egg, milk, and butter together.

## We love our dogs

### All descended from the gray wolf, perfessors say

HE CAME WITH US when we first moved to Nashville in the summer of 1950. He was an adult mixed mixed mixed breed dog that had belonged to my Uncle Jack who was shipping out with the Navy. The dog was named Bivens, for the Texarkana area community where he was born.

We -- my brothers and I -- couldn't say Bivens. We called him Bibby. Classic mutt -- small, short legs and black.

At the time, our large backyard at College Street was fenced. Bibby lived in the back yard and that is where me and my brothers learned our first lesson about dogs -- watch where you step, especially if you're barefoot.

The side yard gate had a large decorative loop at the top. Bibby -- being a superb athlete and smart, was pretty quick to learn that with a running start he could leap through that loop. After that he was free to roam the neighborhood. In fact, there are probably still some dogs in the old neighborhood that carry Bibby's genes.

What happened to Bibby? His disappearance may have had something to do with us uprooting to California for a year while my father was doing Marine Corps duty during the Korean War.

When we returned to Nashville I was a third-grader, and our dog was Dusty, a collie that had extrasensory perception. In the summer when he shed his winter coat, great gobs of hair swung heavily from his undercarriage. I swear, every time we tried to sneak up on him to give him a summertime buzz cut, he knew it. He had a way to get under the house, and he'd stay there until we forgot about the haircut. No amount of coaxing could get him out.

We do love our dogs, don't we?

I saw an article about the domestication of dogs which was thought to have happened about 16,000 years ago somewhere near China. All dog species are thought to have descended from the gray wolf. Great pony-sized mastiffs, teacup tiny little yap dogs and even Bibby and Dusty -- all from the same gray wolf.

The way scientists have been able to tell dog bones from wolf bones is that one is still clutching a caveman's leather pennyloafer in its jaws (For our new readers coming over from the 'News,' that last sentence was what we call a joke.)

There is no animal on earth that loves and serves man as much as the dog.

Wilbur was further found guilty of biting Julie's ankle. So Wilbur went on a ride. And this is my confession. I put him out beside a pile of dog food on the side of the road near Cottonshed and never looked back.

I suppose that dog lovers would think that was just as bad as that mean ol' woman who poisoned Smokey.

For the first time in almost 13 years, our readers in Nashville woke up June 1 in a one-news-paper town. You might not have noticed as you went about your daily activities.

The sale of Graves Publishing Co. was completed the day before, a sale which included the *Nashville News*, *Murfreesboro Diamond*, *Glenwood Herald* and *Montgomery County News*.

The final issue for the *News* was May 31; the other papers will be produced as usual.

Negotiations for the acquisition of the papers began last August. They took a fall, literally, when your editor broke his leg and was out of circulation for a few weeks.

Eventually, the process resumed, and the sale was finalized last week.

We've heard lots of questions and rumors about the sale, some going back long before closing day. People in Nashville often find out what's going on long before any announcement is made. Surprise.

Here are some of the questions, along with answers.

**What will the paper be called?** The *Nashville News-Leader*. The *Nashville News* dated back to 1878. It's hard to put aside 138 years of history, especially since I teach a history class at Nashville High. And, when one paper acquires another, it's fairly common to put the two names together, i.e. *Arkansas Democrat-Gazette*. *News-Leader*

rolls off the tongue pretty easily, don't you think? And the two words actually go together in that order.

**Which reporters and ad people came to you from the News staff?** Natasha Worley, Nicole Tracy and Terrica Hendrix joined us Monday. Natasha and Nicole went to work immediately with Tracy Denny-Bailey to sell advertising. They will also write stories. Terrica spent her first day making the rounds at Vacation Bible Schools, talking to kids and teachers and taking pictures, one of which appears on today's front page. You'll see more of their work in coming weeks.

**Will you offer commercial printing?** Yes. Bobby Chambers has joined us and will continue to serve his customers, just as he has for many years.

**What features will you add from the News?** "The Early Files" by Patsy Young and Baxter Black's column will appear on our pages in coming days. We also plan to expand our Kid's Page and church page, along with periodically adding a farm page. Having more writers will help us cover more of what's going on in our communities, including religion, healthcare, education, business, sports and other topics in which readers are interested.

Schools receive facilities funding

The state recently awarded Arkansas school districts about \$44.5 million in funding for this year, to pay for new construction and renovation of existing facilities to make sure they are safe, warm and dry.

Facilities funding is a vital part of state aid to local schools, and is distributed according to a formula that takes into account the local wealth of school districts.

The state's share of total facilities funding is proportionately lower in districts where local property taxes generate the most revenue. Conversely, the state's share is greater in school districts in which millage rates generate less in property tax revenue.

The Arkansas Constitution mandates that state government provide an equal and adequate education to all children, regardless of which area of the state they live in.

The Supreme Court has ruled that distributing money for facilities is an essential component of the state's duty to provide an adequate education.

The current constitutional basis for school funding, as set out by the Arkansas Supreme Court, resulted from a lawsuit

filed by the former Lake View School District a small, rural school in the delta of east Arkansas. A Pulaski County judge ruled in the Lake View suit in 2001 that properly equipped school buildings are critical for education and must be provided by the state.

In 2003 the legislature created a facilities committee and in a special session that year appropriated \$10 million for a statewide assessment of school facilities.

In 2005 the total cost of bringing schools up to standards was estimated to be about \$1.93 billion. Since then the state has provided more than \$1 billion in facilities funding.

The bulk of state facilities funding was allocated in 2007 when the legislature added \$455.5 million in new funding for school facilities. Shortly after the 2007 legislative session, the Supreme Court removed the state from its supervision and since then the state has no longer been embroiled in the Lake View case.

Since 2007 the state has provided from \$40 million to \$60 million for school facilities each year.

Last year the legislature pro-

vided about \$40 million in General Improvement Funds for school facilities.

This year's funding is for 49 projects. They include construction of new schools, renovations of schools and upgrading of plumbing and electrical equipment.

**Lottery Ticket Sales**

State lottery officials announced that sales of tickets in Fiscal Year 2016 have surpassed those of FY 2015, with a month left to go.

Total sales last year were \$410 million and so far this year they amount to \$419 million. The fiscal year ends on June 30.

The Powerball jackpot in January paid \$1.6 billion and generated heightened sales in Arkansas, as well as in other states. Those increased sales helped boost ticket sales over last year.

After prizes are awarded and administrative costs are paid, revenue from the state lottery goes for college scholarships. According to lottery officials, since 2009 more than 200,000 scholarships have been awarded to Arkansas students attending state institutions. The total worth of those scholarships is more than \$573 million.

Graduation day an important event

As governor, I get a lot of calls about economic development. When a business is considering relocating or expanding in Arkansas, the abilities of the state's existing and upcoming workforce are always a key part of the discussion.

It is critical to equip our students, young and old, with workforce training opportunities to give them a competitive edge. That way, Arkansans can graduate with skills that meet the needs of employers -- and ultimately, can be successful in any career.

Benjamin Franklin said, "An investment in knowledge pays the best interest." In Arkansas, we are moving closer toward bringing a new generation of

skilled workers and professionals into our state's labor force. Already, our state has funded several new Secondary Career Centers in the past year, bringing the statewide total to more than 40 centers.

Additionally, Arkansas is working to close the education attainment gap by setting goals in the Department of Higher Education to increase post-high school degree and certificate attainment from 40 percent to 60 percent by the year 2025. ## SNAP recipients will receive double benefits at Howard County Farmers' Market

The Arkansas Coalition for Obesity Prevention (ARCOP) has awarded Howard County Farmers' Market a grant which allows Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients at the market to double their spending power.

The grant, known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program, doubles the value of federal SNAP benefits (previously termed "food stamps") spent at participating farmers markets, helping people bring home more healthy fruits and vegetables while supporting local farmers.

Howard County Farmers' Market is approved to accept SNAP benefits and will provide a one-to-one

match in free Double Up Food Bucks, up to \$20 per day, to customers shopping with their SNAP EBT cards. As an example, a customer who purchases \$15 with their SNAP EBT card will receive an additional \$15 in tokens to use at the market.

The Double Up Food Bucks can only be redeemed for fresh fruits and vegetables with participating vendors at the market and is limited to \$20 each day at market.

Symmetry’s bid includes base construction, turf and logo installation. Architect and engineering fees are not included, according to Graham.

About 40-50 feet of the concrete curbing around the track will be replaced, Graham said.

Symmetry is “a great company. They’ve done high school, college and NFL fields,” Graham said.

Among the NFL fields are Mercedes Benz Superdome in New Orleans, Baltimore Ravens game field, Minnesota Vikings indoor practice field and former game field at the Metrodome.

Colleges which have utilized Symmetry Turf include University of Cincinnati, Tulane University, University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, Hendrix College, University of Houston and a new soccer field at Texas A&M in Texarkana, among many others.

Arkansas high schools with Symmetry fields include Pulaski Academy, Brookland, Cabot, Har-Ber, Pottsville, Bentonville and Searcy, as well as schools in more than a dozen other states.

Nashville “looked at fields in 3 states,” said,

along with in-state schools, Graham said. “We ranked [Symmetry] highly before the bid opening, then we saw that they are the low end” on costs.

The most recent visits for Nashville district officials came last weekend and included PA, Searcy and Cabot.

The turf project will be fully funded by local sponsors, Graham said. Ten sponsors were on board as of Monday night.

They include the following:

- Diamond Level - Diamond Bank
- Gold Level - Coca Cola Bottling Co. of Nashville, Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas
- Silver Level - Farm Bureau Insurance, Friends of Billy Laird, McDonald’s, Aramark, Smith’s Ready Mix, Tyson, Trendsetters Boutique/Porter’s Lotion.

In other business during Monday’s special meeting, the board accepted a maximum guaranteed price of \$287,000 from Doyle Howard Construction, Inc., to construct two classrooms at Nashville Primary School.

State partnership funds will pay \$152,000 on the project, with the remaining \$135,000 coming from the district.

The Arkansas Facilities Division approved a cost of \$410,000-\$420,000 for the project, with the district budgeting \$200,000 as its share.

Because the state origi-

nally approved a higher amount, the board authorized Graham to look at the possibility of constructing four classrooms instead of two.

“We can build four rooms as easily as two,” Graham said, “If facilities will partner with us on it or if we do four for \$400,000, that’s a heck of a deal. If we don’t do four, we’re leaving [state] money on the table.”

Graham planned to contact the facilities division this week about funding for two more rooms.

The earliest date for the rooms to be completed is December, Graham said.

Board members accepted the resignation of junior high science teacher Carol Hendrix.

The board voted to hire James Conant, technology assistant; Aubrey Basiliere, special education; Wade Matlock, science; and transferred A.J. Whitmore to ALE para-professional.

The board approved a proposed budget of expenditures for the fiscal year July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018.

Teachers were hired to the district’s summer school programs.

Board members will meet Tuesday, June 14, at 12 noon for a presentation from Stephens, Inc.

The agenda likely will include “everything we normally do in June” and could take care of the usual meeting on the third Monday of the month, Graham said.
