Scrapper Stadium turf approved

The Nashville School Board Monday night approved the installation of artificial turf at Scrapper Stadium in time for the coming season.

Board members unanimously accepted the low bid of \$576,762 from Symmetry Turf of Mt. Pleasant, Texas. The bid was well below the early estimate of \$650,000.

Private sponsorships will pay for the entire project.

Superintendent Doug Graham says the school district has 10 days to finalize the design. From there, excavation at the field will begin in less than a week.

Preparing the base will take 3-4 weeks, according to Graham. Another 3-4 weeks will be required to lay the turf. "It has to be sewn together every five yards," Graham said.

"This will be a 60 to 65-day process. Our goal is to be done by Aug. 1. Depending on the weather, it could be

completed later or earlier," Graham said.

"We're ready to get moving. We'll be going from one of the best natural grass fields in the state to one of the best artificial surfaces in the state."

The district hasn't decided what to do with topsoil from Scrapper Stadium. "We may spread some dirt from the north end zone onto the new field to have some of that Scrapper Magic," Graham said, noting that a number of key plays have been made in that part of the field.

"Coaches have asked us about dirt from the north end zone. Some wanted it for their fields."

Six companies submitted bids on the turf project, Graham said. Bids were opened June 2.

In addition to Symmetry, bidders included the following:

Geo Surfaces - \$612,000.

Shaw Sportex - \$640,575.

Local VFD participates in fire boat training

LAKE DEGRAY-Joplin volunteer Fire Department and Murfreesboro Volunteer Fire Department were among the 34 fire boat crews and departments who participated in the 2016 Arkansas Fire Boat School.

This marked the 13th year for the fire boat training event, which was held Saturday, June 4, at DeGray Lake near Arkadelphia. The training event allows fire boat crews to train under realistic conditions.

Large boat and small boat crews participated in a series of scenarios designed to prepare them for a variety of situations. Scenarios included wildland fire scenario, medical scenario with victims in a boat prop, plane crash with a simulated fire, boat de-watering, tanker refill, and a defensive driving serpentine course.

The scenarios are designed by leaders in emergency response from various federal, state and local organizations. Groups involved include: Arkansas Forestry Commission, Arkansas Game & Fish Commission, Arkansas Fire Academy, LifeNet, Air Evac, and a host of fire departments from across the state.

Some scenarios involved volunteers serving as "crash victims." Some of the victims were made up and prosthetics to simulate injuries.

Drug-related trial set July 11-12 in criminal court

A defendant facing three drug-related felony charges rejected the state's plea bargain offer last Wednesday, June 1, and two days have been set aside in July for his criminal trial.

Channing Matrelle Harris, 24, black male, Mineral Springs, was originally charged in October of 2015 with a pair of class D felonies -- possession of Schedule VI controlled substance with purpose of delivery, and possession of drug paraphernalia, and a class Y felony, simultaneous possession of drugs and firearms.

Bond was reduced to \$10,000 but he was cautioned not to leave the state. Pretrial motions will be heard Aug. 10.


A trial date of July 26 was set for Paige J. Walker, 42, white female, Nashville, who is charged with class B felony maintaining a drug premises. She also faces other charges related to drug felonies.

One defendant is still in evaluation for drug court program and will make a formal plea June 20 if she meets the requirements.

The sentencing will take place on regular court day in Pike County for Wendy Kinkade, 30, white female, Nashville, charged with delivery of methamphetamine or cocaine, class B felony. Pretrial motions will be heard Oct. 12.



Do maintenance.

John Gottman, one of the country's foremost authorities in marriage research, says that a trip to Hawaii won't heat up a relationship if you haven't kept the pilot light lit. It isn't the great big events that are the key to having a continuing healthy relationship.

Instead the little conversations, the spending 10 to 15 minutes a day to catch up on each other, the doing little things together whether it's working in the yard or painting a room or watching videos.

Little things done together regularly provide maintenance that's very important.

Foster companionship.

Jonathan Haidt, talks about the idea that in the early stages of a relationship the romance initially skyrockets and then starts to decline within a short period of time. For a relationship to continue, it's important for people to evolve gracefully from the electric jolt of early romance to the sweet satisfaction of being with someone whose company is comforting.

Gottman recommends keeping a list of the qualities that we enjoy in our partner in a wallet, keeping photos of cherished times handy, or keeping a small scrapbook handy to page through every now and then and remind us of the good times and help us remember what we enjoyed about them in the first place. That is the key to a healthy relationship.

What happened to Bibby? His disappearance may have had something to do with us uprooting to California for a year while my father was doing Marine Corps duty during the Korean War.

When we returned to Nashville I was a third-grader, and our dog was Dusty, a collie that had extrasensory perception. In the summer when he shed his winter coat, great gobs of hair swung heavily from his undercarriage. I swear, every time we tried to sneak up on him to give him a summertime buzz cut, he knew it. He had a way to get under the house, and he'd stay there until we forgot about the haircut. No amount of coaxing could get him out.

We do love our dogs, don't we?

I saw an article about the domestication of dogs which was thought to have happened about 16,000 years ago somewhere near China. All dog species are thought to have descended from the gray wolf. Great pony-sized mastiffs, teacup tiny little yap dogs and even Bibby and Dusty -- all from the same gray wolf.

The way scientists have been able to tell dog bones from wolf bones is that one is still clutching a caveman's leather pennyloafer in its jaws (For our new readers coming over from the 'News,' that last sentence was what we call a joke.)

There is no animal on earth that loves and serves man as much as the dog.

After Bibby and Dusty there was a procession at our house of dogs of all breeds, sizes and levels of intelligence.

I guess our favorite of all time was Smokey, a male German shepherd, who was Swampy's constant companion. Smokey roamed the three blocks between our house and the 'News' office freely, and that led to his death. He was poisoned by a woman who hated dogs and kids. We didn't have a veterinarian in town in those days, and Swampy had to rush him to Hope. He died on the way.

Our first dog was Faubus. He was a wedding present, and he lived, I believe, about six months.

Later we had Wilbur D. Mills, and this brings me to my second confession of the day. Wilbur was found guilty of leading a pack of dogs that chased Julie who was riding her bicycle. Wilbur was further found guilty of biting Julie's ankle. So Wilbur went on a ride. And this is my confession. I put him out beside a pile of dog food on the side of the road near Cottonshed and never looked back.

I suppose that dog lovers would think that was just as bad as that mean ol' woman who poisoned Smokey.

We do love our dogs, don't we?

For the first time in almost 13 years, our readers in Nashville woke up June 1 in a one-newspaper town. You might not have noticed as you went about your daily activities.

The sale of Graves Publishing Co. was completed the day before, a sale which included the *Nashville News*, *Murfreesboro Diamond*, *Glenwood Herald* and *Montgomery County News*.

The final issue for the *News* was May 31; the other papers will be produced as usual.

Negotiations for the acquisition of the papers began last August. They took a fall, literally, when your editor broke his leg and was out of circulation for a few weeks.

Eventually, the process resumed, and the sale was finalized last week.

We've heard lots of questions and rumors about the sale, some going back long before closing day. People in Nashville often find out what's going on long before any announcement is made. Surprise.

What will the paper be called? The *Nashville News-Leader*. The *Nashville News* dated back to 1878. It's hard to put aside 138 years of history, especially since I teach a history class at Nashville High. And, when one paper acquires another, it's fairly common to put the two names together, i.e. *Arkansas Democrat-Gazette*. *News-Leader*

rolls off the tongue pretty easily, don't you think? And the two words actually go together in that order.

Which reporters and ad people came to you from the *News* staff? Natasha Worley, Nicole Tracy and Terrica Hendrix joined us Monday. Natasha and Nicole went to work immediately with Tracy Denny-Bailey to sell advertising. They will also write stories. Terrica spent her first day making the rounds at Vacation Bible Schools, talking to kids and teachers and taking pictures, one of which appears on today's front page. You'll see more of their work in coming weeks.

Will you offer commercial printing? Yes. Bobby Chambers has joined us and will continue to serve his customers, just as he has for many years.

What features will you add from the *News*? "The Early Files" by Patsy Young and Baxter Black's column will appear on our pages in coming days.

We also plan to expand our Kid's Page and church page, along with periodically adding a farm page. Having more writers will help us cover more of what's going on in our communities, including religion, healthcare, education, business, sports and other topics in which readers are interested.

What about the website? Our website will continue to be www.nashvilleleader.com. Jon Chambers is in the process of incorporating the papers at Murfreesboro, Glenwood and

Mt. Ida into the site, along with the archives of the *News*. We plan to add more features to the site as well.

How has the sale affected the other newspapers? It's business as usual, for the most part. Some changes are in the works that we think their readers will like, and the papers will introduce them soon.

Will the sale benefit the community? We believe that it will. We appreciate our loyal readers and advertisers who have supported us for the past 13 years. Now they will have the opportunity to advertise in one paper and subscribe to one paper instead of choosing between two or spending their hard-earned money on both. This will be positive for all of them.

Is Louie staying? This one is last, but certainly not least. Of course he is staying. We can't have the paper without him!

The entire process has been interesting, to say the least. Putting together the circulation lists, billing lists, and advertising has been a monumental task, one which Pam McAnelly and Tracy Denny-Bailey have spent countless hours on. Thanks to them for all their work. John Balch and Jon Chambers are taking care of the website transition. Louie and I are doing what we do best - offering moral support and staying out of the way.

The *News-Leader* is a work in progress. We welcome our new readers and advertisers, and we thank our long-time supporters. We hope you like the results.

Schools receive facilities funding

The state recently awarded Arkansas school districts about \$44.5 million in funding for this year, to pay for new construction and renovation of existing facilities to make sure they are safe, warm and dry.

Facilities funding is a vital part of state aid to local schools, and is distributed according to a formula that takes into account the local wealth of school districts.

The state's share of total facilities funding is proportionately lower in districts where local property taxes generate the most revenue. Conversely, the state's share is greater in school districts in which millage rates generate less in property tax revenue.

The Arkansas Constitution mandates that state government provide an equal and adequate education to all children, regardless of which area of the state they live in.

The Supreme Court has ruled that distributing money for facilities is an essential component of the state's duty to provide an adequate education.

The current constitutional basis for school funding, as set out by the Arkansas Supreme Court, resulted from a lawsuit

filed by the former Lake View School District a small, rural school in the delta of east Arkansas. A Pulaski County judge ruled in the Lake View suit in 2001 that properly equipped school buildings are critical for education and must be provided by the state.

In 2003 the legislature created a facilities committee and in a special session that year appropriated \$10 million for a statewide assessment of school facilities.

In 2005 the total cost of bringing schools up to standards was estimated to be about \$1.93 billion. Since then the state has provided more than \$1 billion in facilities funding.

The bulk of state facilities funding was allocated in 2007 when the legislature added \$455.5 million in new funding for school facilities. Shortly after the 2007 legislative session, the Supreme Court removed the state from its supervision and since then the state has no longer been embroiled in the Lake View case.

Since 2007 the state has provided from \$40 million to \$60 million for school facilities each year.

Last year the legislature pro-

vided about \$40 million in General Improvement Funds for school facilities.

This year's funding is for 49 projects. They include construction of new schools, renovations of schools and upgrading of plumbing and electrical equipment.

Lottery Ticket Sales

State lottery officials announced that sales of tickets in Fiscal Year 2016 have surpassed those of FY 2015, with a month left to go.

Total sales last year were \$410 million and so far this year they amount to \$419 million. The fiscal year ends on June 30.

The Powerball jackpot in January paid \$1.6 billion and generated heightened sales in Arkansas, as well as in other states. Those increased sales helped boost ticket sales over last year.

After prizes are awarded and administrative costs are paid, revenue from the state lottery goes for college scholarships. According to lottery officials, since 2009 more than 200,000 scholarships have been awarded to Arkansas students attending state institutions. The total worth of those scholarships is more than \$573 million.

SNAP recipients will receive double benefits at Howard County Farmers' Market

The Arkansas Coalition for Obesity Prevention (ARCOP) has awarded Howard County Farmers' Market a grant which allows Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients at the market to double their spending power.

The grant, known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program, doubles the value of federal SNAP benefits (previously termed "food stamps") spent at participating farmers markets, helping people bring home more healthy fruits and vegetables while supporting local farmers.

Howard County Farmers' Market is approved to accept SNAP benefits and will provide a one-to-one

match in free Double Up Food Bucks, up to \$20 per day, to customers shopping with their SNAP EBT cards. As an example, a customer who purchases \$15 with their SNAP EBT card will receive an additional \$15 in tokens to use at the market.

The Double Up Food Bucks can only be redeemed for fresh fruits and vegetables with participating vendors at the market and is limited to \$20 each day at market.



Serena Jameka Williams (September 26, 1981) - She is an American professional Tennis player. She ranks number one in the women's singles tennis by the WTA. Christian Refresher - 1 Timothy 2:1-5 KJV







Dierks Kayak Festival June 17-19 in tailwaters of Horseshoe Bend

The short stretch of churning whitewater at Horseshoe Bend below Dierks Lake will become an paddler's playground June 17-19 during the Dierks Kayak Festival and Hometown Throw Down event, according to Rob Koller of Kayak Republic.

Kayak Republic will host the three-day event in conjunction with the World Kayak Club, whose Hometown Throw Down event was merged this year with the festival.


"Everyone needs to come out and check this out, especially on Saturday," Koller said last week when announcing the events were back on after initially being cancelled due to an issue with a water release deviations controlled by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

"This is a big deal for the area and kayakers from all over will be there."

The schedule of events for Friday, June 17 includes clinics on general river safety, swift water rescue and introduction courses to kayaking and canoeing. Ouachita Outdoor Outfitters (OOO), one of the event's main sponsors, will have a variety of their boats on location for demonstrations. The rest of Friday will leave time for participants to practice for Saturday's full day of events and competitions.

On Saturday at 10 a.m., sign-ups will begin for the "Race the Shoe" downriver race, which will start at 11:00. Koller said "the Shoe" is a feature created among the whitewater rapids of the Saline River.

The World Kayak Club's Hometown Throw Down competition will then be held at 2 p.m., which will include a whitewater rodeo and slalom races. Sign-up for that event starts at 1:00.

Koller said there will also be a chance for the general public to have some fun in the water Saturday evening. At 5 p.m., "raft and shredder" rides will be offered for those willing to climb aboard. The rides will be \$5 for non-ACA members, a fee that will cover insurances purposes. Helmets and lifejackets will be provided for the rides in both children and adult sizes.

At 6:00, a "Hunker Down Tournament" will be held, which Kellar said involves participants in big rafts competing an event similar to a tug-of-war. "Whoever ends up in the water doesn't win," he said.

Kellar, who is a war veteran, said a fundraiser for

disabled veterans, "Heroes on the Water, will hit the rapids at 6:30. Donations will be sought to support the cause.

Saturday's events will wrap up at 7:30 with a musical performance by Ryan Sauders, courtesy of sponsor OOO.

The festival will wrap up Sunday and will include a kayak bass tournament up on Dierks Lake. The tournament will be open to anyone who has a kayak and wants to participate, Kellar said. The tournament will begin at "safe light" and end at 1 p.m. with a weigh-in at 2 p.m. The tournament entry fee will be \$30.

The rest of Sunday will consist of a whitewater "play day at the Shoe."






