Cheer clinic to be held Sept. 19-22 at Dome

The Nashville Scrapper cheerleaders will conduct their annual cheer clinic in conjunction with the Nashville vs. Arkadelphia football game and tailgate party Sept. 23.

Countdown hits Day 2

Scrappers, Bobcats set Friday night

Last year at this time, Mike Volarvich was heading into his first game as a high school football coach when his Nashville Scrappers would host the Hope Bobcats.

The Scrappers won by one point, and Volarvich admits he was "kind of nervous. I didn't want to go home with a loss."

The Scrappers went on to win the District 7-4A championship and the state Class 4A championship, compiling a perfect 15-0 record along the way.

Nashville will face Hope again this Friday night. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. at Hope.

Volarvich went to Hope last week for the Bobcats' scrimmage with Texarkana. He told the Nashville Rotary Club Aug. 24 that he "saw some of our players in the endzone watching. We had a large group out."

After the scrimmage, Volarvich ate at the Hope Taco Bell, a stop which his Scrappers had made as well. "A guy started talking to me and said, 'Are you their coach?'"

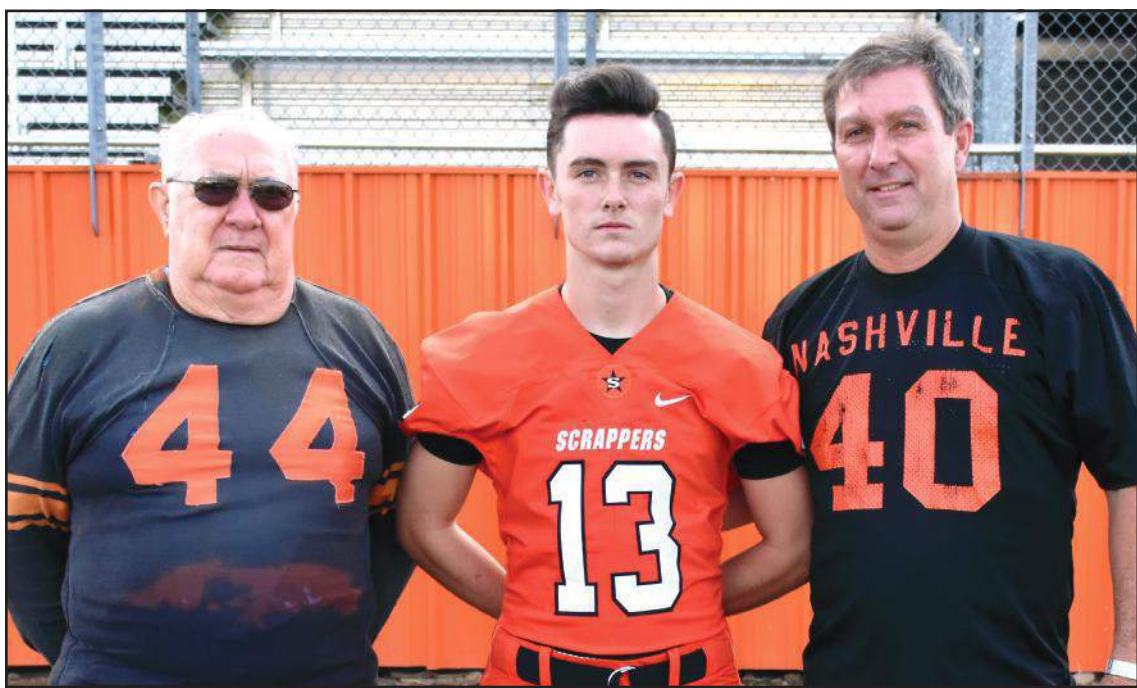
Volarvich replied that he was. "Those guys are a great group of kids," the Taco Bell manager said. "They're very respectful. It was all, 'Yes sir, no sir.' I thought I should tell you."

The Scrappers "represented our school and community well," Volarvich said. "It made me feel good. I don't always hear the good things, but this guy thought he should tell me." Volarvich is pleased with his team overall after spring practice, summer drills and fall camp. The Scrappers defeated El Dorado 21-14 in a scrimmage Aug. 24, and they've spent this week cleaning up mistakes and preparing for Friday night's season opener.

Hope will "present some different problems. El Dorado has a bend but don't break defense. They line up in the same spot. Hope is never in the same spot. They try to create chaos on defense. They'll make some big plays, but they'll give up some big plays. It's high risk, high reward. We have to make sure we're sound."

The Bobcats are coached by former Scrapper and OBU Tiger Jay Turley.

They have "a good quarterback, Austin Stubber. He's the top player on the team. He throws well. Neutralizing what he does is a big key point in being able to beat them," Volarvich said.

Friday night will be "an exciting environment. There should be a lot of people there. You can throw the records out the window in a rivalry like this. The players all know each other. We have to overcome the early adrenaline rush and play our style," Volarvich said. We'll have to be really sound in what we do schematically."

Scrimmage

Looking back at the El Dorado contest, Volarvich was "really happy with the effort and the way our guys flew around. On defense, we had one busted coverage that led to

a touchdown."

The other Wildcat TD came on an interception return for a score.

The Scrappers stopped El Dorado just short of the goalline on fourth and goal as time expired to secure the 21-14 win.

Nashville "gave them a first down on a penalty. Except for that, we only allowed one first down in the whole half of football."

The Scrappers held El Dorado to 1.9 yards per rush. "Anytime you do that, you're playing pretty good football, especially considering the size difference," according to Volarvich.

Offensively, the Scrappers put up a 13-play scoring drive and two 11-play scoring drives.

"We were able to drive the ball without shooting ourselves in the foot. That's something you like to see, especially early in the year. Early is when you see a lot of self-inflicted mis-

takes. We limited a lot of those," Volarvich said.

The Wildcat and Scrapper varsity teams played the entire first half, with JV action in the second half.

The first half saw 52 offensive plays for Nashville compared to 24 for El Dorado.

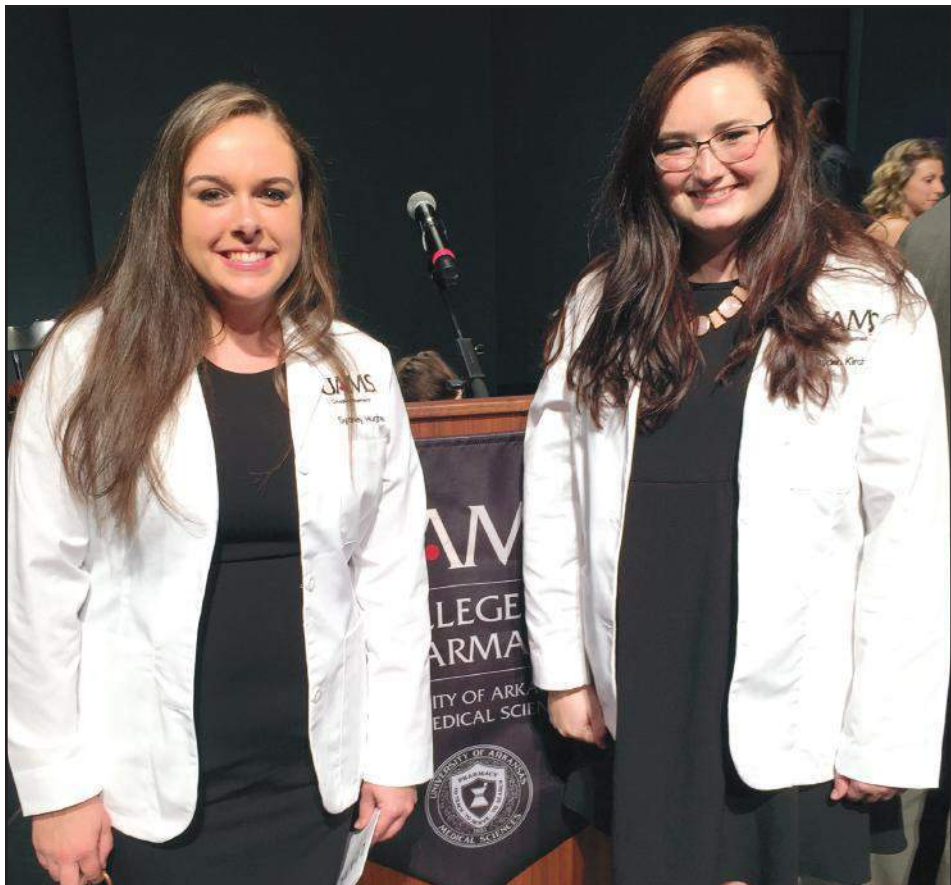
"We got a bunch of reps. We played some different guys in the second quarter," Volarvich said.

Big plays for the night offensively came from Ty Pettway and Dominick Kight, both of whom "went up and got the football."

On defense, Shun Childress "had a good night at nose guard. Dennis Scott and Jordan White were good in the secondary."

Overall, the scrimmage was "a good measuring point to see where we are. We still have to put four quarters together. The

Two of alleged bank robbers set for court appearance here

When jail inmates garbed in orange marched across the street from the jail for appearances in the county courtroom, Wednesday morning, two of them were to be officially informed that they were being charged with the July 25 armed robbery of the Diamond Bank branch in Mineral Springs.

The two are Tatyana McBee, 18, black female, and Byron Coleman, 30, black male, both Tulsa residents who were recently arrested there by a team of Arkansas, Oklahoma and federal lawmen.

Two other defendants, Bobby Padillow, 24, black male, and Jamari Bradford, 21, black male, both of Tulsa, remain in custody in Oklahoma because of previous warrants.

The group may have been involved in other bank robberies.

Lead investigators have been Arkansas State Police Special Investigators John Rhone and Corwin Battle. Officers from the Howard County Sheriff's Office, Nashville Police Department, Mineral Springs Police Department and the FBI have all been involved.

The ASP investigators, Howard County Investigator

Blake Eudy and Nashville Police Investigator Larry Marion, went to Tulsa accompanied by an FBI agent, and worked with the Tulsa Police Department to make the arrests.

The amount taken in the robbery has not been announced. Nothing has been recovered, Sheriff Bryan McJunkins has told the *News-Leader*.

The four robbers burst into the Mineral Springs branch of Diamond Bank at about 3 p.m., and were inside the bank for less than two minutes. Two were armed, and pointed their semi-automatic firearms at the two bank employees and one customer who were inside. Security cameras caught the robbery in progress. Two of the robbers leaped over the counter and filled bags with cash from the drawers. Then they fled the bank on back streets. Officers said it appeared that all of the crew went inside the bank -- they apparently did not leave a get-away driver.

Clothing they wore was found discarded in the city park about six blocks away.

Lawmen from the area converged on Mineral Springs but the foursome was able to escape.

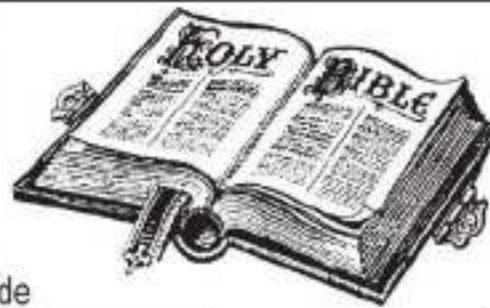

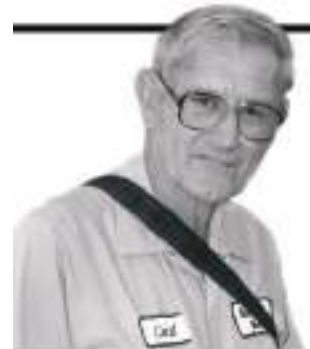

Sometime this fall Howard County will be in a new business, that of storing and covering with dirt the waste matter from houses, businesses and institutions. The project is named the Howard County Sanitary Landfill and is the result of federal and state prodding to do something with waste instead of burning it or dropping it in obscure places.

The vast dumping area is 57 acres of an abandoned quarry on State Highway 369 near the Briar Plant, which has been strip mined by Weyerhaeuser for gypsum. County Judge O'Neal Davidson's work forces have prepared the abandoned quarry site with roads and ditches.

Arkansas traffic safety campaign will continue through Labor Day

The State Police will continue its traffic safety campaign through the end of the Labor Day weekend.

The State Police Highway Safety Office is partnering with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to stop drunk driving and save lives.

Drinking alcohol was a factor in 162 traffic fatalities, or 40 percent of all deaths on the highway over the Labor Day weekend of 2014. Every year for the previous five years, an average of 10,000 people nationwide died in crashes caused by drunk driving.

In Arkansas the State Police are conducting a high-visibility enforcement campaign called "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over." The standing order for state and local law enforcement officers is zero tolerance for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

They will operate sobriety checkpoints and will be patrolling the roads in greater numbers than usual over the holiday weekend.

The total number of traffic fatalities in the United States may surpass 40,000 this year. If so, it would be the first time since

2007. In recent years, the number of traffic fatalities has hovered around 32,000 and 33,000.

Last year the total increased to about 35,000. Traffic safety experts attribute the recent increase in fatalities to a surge in driving, made possible by relatively low prices for gasoline.

Also, cheaper gas means that more people drive further distances for vacations and holidays, which is riskier than driving on familiar streets in your hometown.

Since the federal Transportation Department began its nationwide census of fatal traffic accidents in 1975, the record for a single year occurred in 1979. That year 51,093 people were killed on the highways.

As of last week, in Arkansas there had been 337 fatalities in 2016. The Highway Safety Office makes these recommendations: designate a sober driver when you expect to consume alcohol; if you have been drinking call a taxi, a friend or a family member to drive you; report any drunk drivers you see to authorities, promptly; always wear seat belts, and if you drive a motorcycle wear protective gear.

Boot Camp to Close

The state Board of Correction

voted to close the boot camp for first time non-violent offenders. The unit was near Tucker and in the past has been at the Wrightsville Unit.

The boot camp had space for 100 men and 24 women. Beds have been vacant in increasing numbers because eligible inmates were not choosing to participate, even after the rigorous military style calisthenics and marching were eliminated.

The 86 men and women now enrolled in the boot camp will be allowed to finish the program.

The facility will be converted into a work release center for women and "re-entry" center that helps them transition back into society.

The Correction Department has dedicated a new facility, a re-entry center for male inmates at Pine Bluff. It is called the Barbara Ester Unit, in honor of an officer killed by an inmate in 2012 at the East Arkansas Regional Unit at Briceyces. Corporal Ester, 47, had served for 12 years.

She was the second security officer killed by an inmate in Arkansas. In 1995 Sergeant Scott Grimes, 41, was killed by an inmate in the Tucker Unit. The Grimes Unit near Newport is named after him.

Computer science coding tour aimed at student awareness

Last week, I was delighted to kick-off my second computer science coding tour at Arkansas high schools. I went to Benton, Bryant, Manila and Spring Hill. This week, we'll continue the tour.

At the start of each assembly, I asked the audience a simple question: How many of you are interested in taking computer science? Only a smattering of hands were raised from the audience, and I knew immediately how important it was for me to be there.

My goal was to reach those students who hadn't raised their hands. Once they heard what computer science was all about and how they could use it to create something new, I got a very different response. When I asked the same question at the end of the presentation, the number of hands tripled.

This year's coding tour is a chance for me to tell students directly that exciting opportunities in computer science and coding are real and available to

them. It's about helping students discover professions within these fields and learn to speak the language of 21st century innovation: computer coding.

Every aspect of education is important, and computer science is just one more way our students can engage with the world around them. Whether you want to be the next Steve Jobs, design video games, create security software, or start your own business, learning to code will help you get there.

Part of being successful is about being able to communicate effectively. This is why communicating in code to maximize what computers can do is giving coders a competitive advantage. It's a numeric language that speaks directly to computers, and anyone can learn.

With the help of the General Assembly, I initiated the first effort in the nation to mandate computer science in every high school.

But here's the thing, students aren't required to take the class. That is why it's so critical that

we continue to raise awareness for our students, parents and guidance counselors about these exciting opportunities. These classes give our students a chance to explore the exciting world of coding, while also earning credit that counts towards graduation.

My mission as governor is not only to create jobs and grow Arkansas's economy, but to put our students ahead of the competition. We've taken a bold step onto the national stage with this initiative, but the most exciting part is that we're just getting started.

In just one year, Arkansas saw a 260 percent enrollment increase of students taking computer science in high school. Just imagine what that number would look like in another year or two when every day, more students, teachers and businesses are seeing the benefits of computer science education. And it's slowly, but surely, putting Arkansans on the cutting edge of the computer science movement.

AG urges fans to review offers before picking TV sports package

Many Arkansans are gearing up for football season and fall premieres and looking into options to get as many games and programming on television that they can. This leads some to consider upgrading television packages to make sure they can watch all of the big games and popular shows. Different providers offer different channel upgrades, and it is important to be educated on the options from your cable or satellite provider.

Arkansas Attorney General Leslie Rutledge issued today's consumer alert to encourage Arkansans to fully research available television packages before determining if an upgrade is right for them.

"Whether it is the Razorbacks, Red Wolves or your favorite NFL team, many of us are anxiously awaiting football season," said Attorney General Rutledge. "But if you cannot make the trip to watch the game in person, watching it on television is the next best thing. It is important to do your research beforehand and educate yourself about the options available to get the services you want."

Attorney General Rutledge released the following tips for consumers looking to upgrade their cable or satellite package.

Review all of the packages and add-ons available through your current provider. These options may include telephone and internet services or high-definition and digital video recorder upgrades to your television. Bundled deals may cost less overall, but make sure you utilize what you pay for.

Consider the type of programming you prefer to watch (sports, movies, children's shows, etc.). Based upon your budget, chose a package that includes the programming you want.

Be realistic about what you will watch so that you do not end up overpaying for channels that you will not use. Keep in mind that receiving HD channels will cost more.

Be wary of promotional deals, as they always have an expiration date. Make sure to read the fine print to see when and how much the price will increase, as well as when your access to certain channels will expire.

Beware of offers of "free installation" or "free equipment." Usually these offers require that you agree to a longer term contract. You may end up paying more than if you paid for the equipment up front.

Also research the best service

providers in your area and be sure to understand equipment, billing and contract agreements.

Former Scrapper coach to be inducted Oct. 8 into Reddie Hall of Fame

ARKADELPHIA - A former Nashville player, coach and school administrator has been selected for induction into the Henderson State University Reddie Hall of Fame.

Dwight Jones will be inducted posthumously in a ceremony Saturday, Oct. 8, at 10 a.m. in the Garrison Center Grand Ballroom on the HSU campus.

Nine individuals and one team will be inducted.

Jones was a three-sport letterman at Nashville, where he played basketball, baseball and golf.

He began his coaching career at Gurdon in 1950 and came to Nashville in 1951 as an assistant football coach.

Jones was head coach of the Scrapers from 1954 to 1966, compiling a 101-44-3 record with the Scrapers winning nine or more games during nine of his 13 seasons.

In 1955, Nashville went 10-0-1 and was ranked No. 1 in Class A and No. 6 overall in the state.

Jones was named Arkansas Coach of the Year in 1962 after leading the Scrapers to a 10-1 record.

More than 30 of Jones' players went on to play football at HSU. In 1967, Jones was named super-

intendent of the Nashville School District, where he served until 1978.

From 1978 to 1988 he worked for the state of Arkansas before becoming owner of First National Insurance Agency.

Jones was selected for the Hall of Honor from the Heritage Category.

Other inductees will include Distinguished Service Award recipient Reggie Speights, Willie Tate Meritorious Humanitarian Award recipient Mike Dugan, Paul Calley, Andre Ware, Larry Wills, Mike Campbell, Janet Taylor, Carrie Hagan Barber and the 1959 Reddie football team.

scrimmage was very vanilla. It will be a lot different in a real game," Volarvich said.

Summer

The Scrapers enter Friday night's game at Hope after a busy summer and fall camp.

Drills began the first week of June and were held on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, with Wednesdays set aside as a make-up day.

There were 12 June workout days and 9 in July, with two weeks off in the summer for the Arkansas Activities Association's

dead weeks, Volarvich said.

"We had 21 workouts. This is a great group of young men. They're extremely hard workers with a great work ethic," Volarvich told the Rotary Club.

Fall camp began Aug. 1 and included weights and meetings before hitting the field for practice.

"Nobody else in the

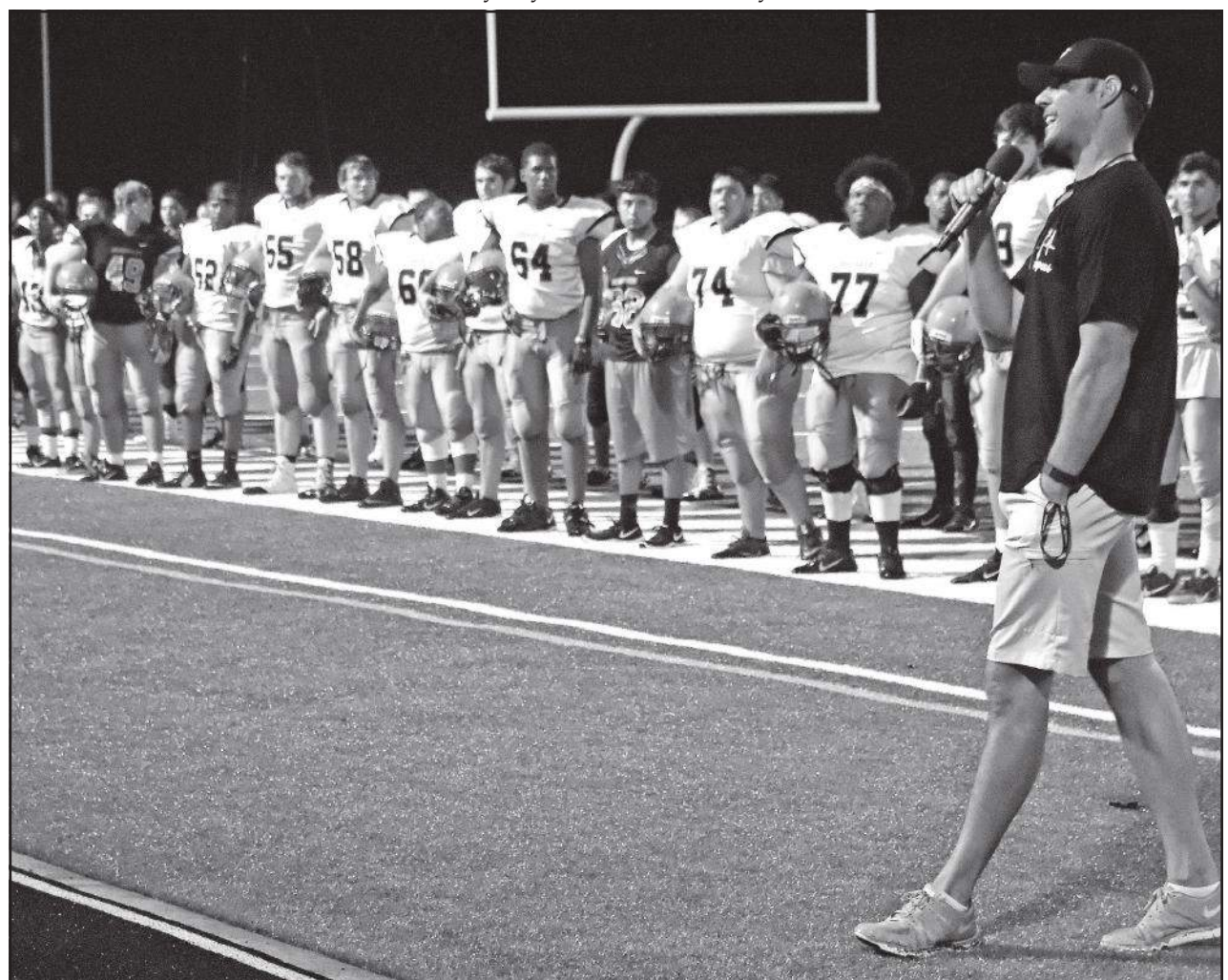
state did what Leonard did last year, but our quarterbacks this year are better at some things than Leonard."

The Scrapers' other strengths include running backs Darius Hopkins, TK Hopkins and Trent Harris.

The offensive line includes three returning starters, Kirby Adcock, Justin Bean and Triston Rhodes.

"Kirby is so much bigger than last year," Volarvich said. As a junior, Adcock was 6-2 1/2. Now as a senior, he's 6-5 and 300 pounds.

Adcock and Hopkins are the squad's college prospects, Volarvich said. Adcock has verbally committed to the University of Arkansas.

As provided in Amendment No. 74, the Statewide Uniform Rate replaces a portion of the existing rate of tax levied by this School District and available for maintenance and operation of schools in this District. The total proposed school tax levy of 34.0 mills includes 25.0 mills specifically voted for general maintenance and operation, and 9.0 mills voted for debt service previously voted as a continuing levy pledged for the retirement of existing bonded indebtedness. The 9.0 existing debt service mills now pledged for the retirement of existing bonded indebtedness, which debt service mills will continue after retirement of the bonds to which now pledged, will be a continuing debt service tax until the retirement of proposed bonds to be issued in the principal amount of \$19,030,000, and which will mature over a period of 32 years and will be issued for the purpose of refunding the District's outstanding bonds, dated August 1, 2006 and June 15, 2011, and erecting and equipping a K-12th grade school facility. The surplus revenues produced each year by the debt service millage may be used by the District for other school purposes.

The total proposed school tax levy of 34.0 mills represents the same rate presently being levied.

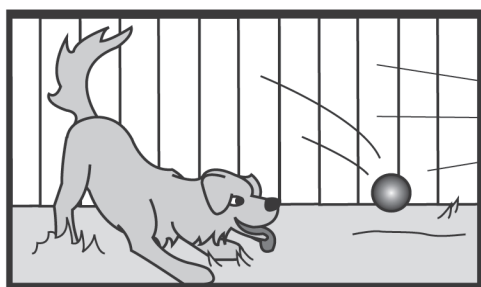

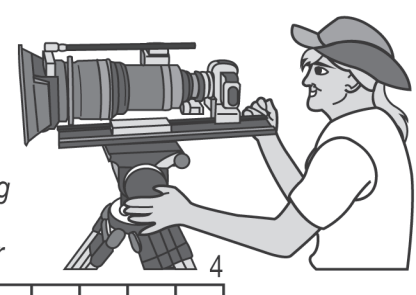
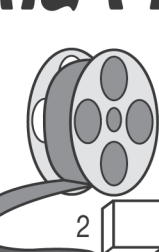

Scottie Maurice Pippen is an American retired basketball player who played professionally in the National Basketball Association. His nickname is "Pip". He is remembered for his time with the Chicago Bulls, the team with which he won six NBA titles. He was considered one of the best small forwards of all time. He was named to the NBA All-Defense team eight times and the All-NBA First team three times. He was a seven time NBA All-Star Game MVP in 1994. He was named one of the 50 greatest players in NBA history during the 1996-97 season. He had many other accolades.

Pippen is the only player to have won an NBA title and Olympic Gold medal in the same year twice (1992 and 1996). He was part of the 1992 U.S. Olympic

"Dream Team" which beat it's opponents by an average of 44 points. He was a two time inductee into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. His number, 33, was retired on January 21, 2010. I had the opportunity to meet Pippen at my school in Chicago, as a student motivator.

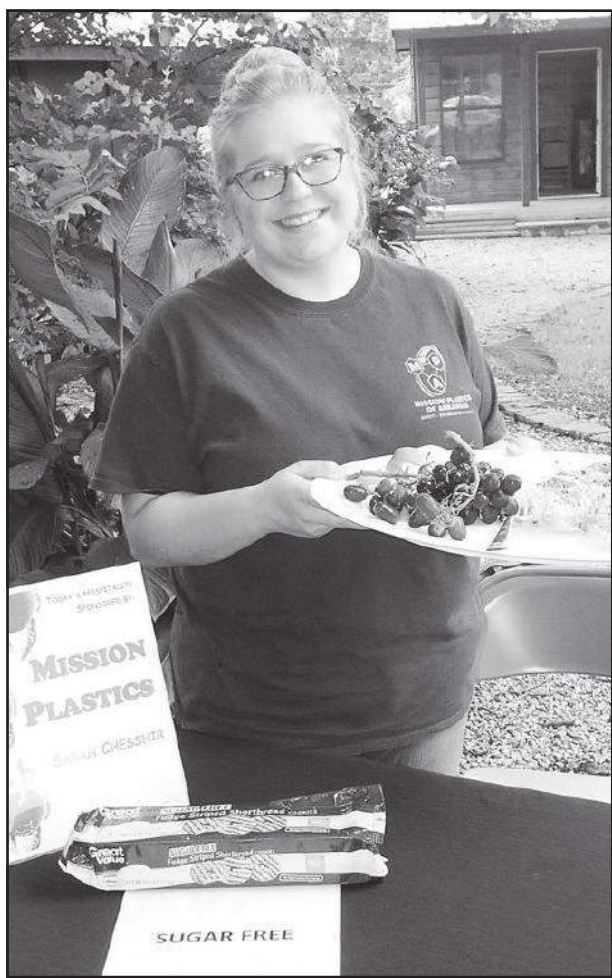

UA hosts cross-laminate timber conference

Division of Agriculture Architecture and design experts with the U of A Fay Jones School of Architecture recently met with timber and forestry experts for a day-long conference intended to examine the feasibility of adopting a new timber technology that produces structural wood products approaching the strength of steel.

Cross-laminate timber, commonly referred to as CLT, is a manufacturing technique which combines layers of timber, cut to common dimensions such as 2'x6', into strong finished materials that can be used in flooring, exterior walls and other building applications.

The "Innovate Arkan-

sas" conference was held Aug. 19 at the U of A Systems offices in Little Rock. About 80 individuals involved in architecture, engineering, building and forestry attended.

Philip Tappe, director of Forest Resources for the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture, said architects and engineers within the university system had initially ignited interest in making CLT a more viable construction material.

"They're really interested in getting a new industry in the state to produce cross-laminated timbers," Tappe said. "And we're certainly supportive of it, but our mission for this meeting was to inform all the attendees about the forest resources that are

available in Arkansas, and its current status.

"Right now in Arkansas, we've got about 19 million forested acres," Tappe said. "We've added 571 million tons of standing timber, about a 57 percent increase, over the last four decades. We're growing about 72 tons a minute of timber in our forests, and it's resulting in a surplus of about 15 million tons per year."

Tappe said much of the forested area in the state is approaching a density that is unsafe due to the increased risk of forest fires, pests and other dangers.

Tappe said the chief obstacle to enticing a private enterprise to establishing a CLT facility in Arkansas is the unknown amount of demand.

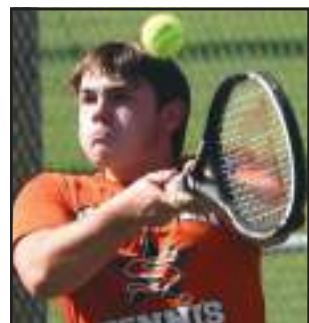

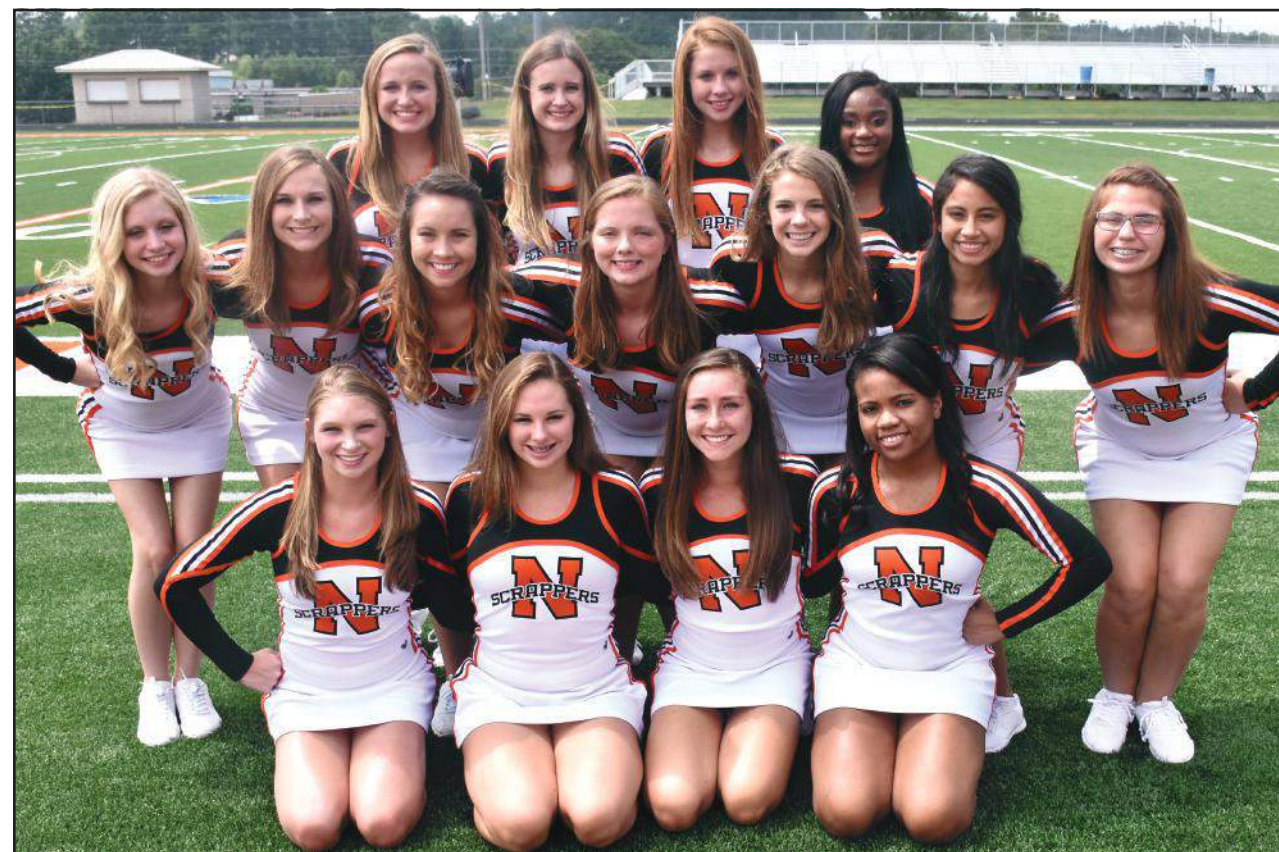

'Grueling season' awaits Scrappers

Entering the season opener Friday night at Hope, the Scrappers are the pre-season pick to win District 7-4A and the Class 4A state title. Both the *Arkansas Democrat-Gazette* and *Hooten's Arkansas Football* have Nashville in the top spot, followed by Warren.

Still, the Scrappers have some spots to fill from last season's 15-0 state championship team. "We have some answered questions," Coach Mike Volarvich said. "As a staff we think we know some answers until we get out there."

At quarterback, "We don't have a guy who started last year." Junior Tyler Hanson will start at QB, with Jake Moorer the back-up.

"Our quarters bring a different skill set than Leonard [Snell from 2015]. We'll identify their strengths and play to them."

Three of the four receivers are new starters, Volarvich said.

Two offensive linemen will be new starters.

Most of this season's starters "have played, but to be the starter and have your number called, there's a difference," Volarvich said. "You hope they step up and get the job done."

Overall, "I feel good with our offensive line and our running back positions. Those are two strong points of the team. I like the level of our talent there and the depth of our running backs. I feel good with all three. Not many teams can say that." TK Hopkins, Trent Harris and Darius Hopkins will be the Scrapper running backs.

On the offensive line, seniors Kirby Adcock, Justin Bean and Triston Rhodes return from last year. "All 3 started 15 games," Volarvich said. Adcock has verbally committed to the University of Arkansas.

Volarvich looks for a good season offensively from Ty Pettway, Dominick Kight, CJ Spencer, Jhalon Finley and Zach Jamison, among others.

The Scrapper offense "will be similar to last year. We'll call the plays and see what works. I hope we stay healthy. We did last year."

This week, the Scrappers have worked on correcting mistakes from last Thursday's scrimmage against El Dorado. "We want to play as clean as we can. We want to fly around on defense and execute on offense," Volarvich said.

The season opener against Hope "is always an exciting game. It's a rivalry. It's the first playing game. It's non conference, but to the communities, it means as much as any game on the schedule," Volarvich said.

Nashville's first home game will be Sept. 9 against the De Queen Leopards. The contest will mark the first official game played on the new synthetic turf at Scrapper Stadium.

"This is a long-time rivalry. It's the home opener and will be an exciting time for us," Volarvich said. "De Queen will present a good challenge. They play a physical brand of football."

The Scrappers "didn't play well against them last year. We were held scoreless on offense the first half. That's one of the few times that one of my teams didn't score the entire first half," Volarvich said.

"People say that a team always shows the most improvement between the first and second game. That wasn't the case last year in the first half. We had miscues and mental busts, but we were able to win in the second half. I expect us to play better this time. A lot of the credit goes to De Queen. They have good players," Volarvich said.

The Scrappers "had a couple of opportunities we didn't take advantage of last year."

Idabel comes to Scrapper Stadium Sept. 16.

"They're new to our schedule. Idabel is a 3A school, and the program is on the rise. The head coach has been there three years and has kind of turned it around. Idabel was 9-1 last year," according to Volarvich.

"We're excited to play a team people here don't know as much about. It will be exciting to see their brand of football."

The District 7-4A race will open Sept. 23 at Scrapper Stadium against Arkadelphia. The Badgers "are always a tough opponent. Coach [J.R.] Eldridge does a great job. We coached against each other when I was at Henderson and he was at Ouachita. Their players are going to do what they're coached to do," Volarvich said. "They play hard."

From there, the Scrappers face "a grueling 7-4A schedule. With the addition of Pulaski Robinson, it's a league where you have to show up every week. If you don't bring your A game, you'll get beat. They say anybody can win on any given night, and that really is the case here," according to Volarvich.

The district could have at least 12 Division I college prospects and more for DII, Volarvich said. "Arkansas as a state usually produces 25-30 D1 players. In 7-4A, we may have 10-12. It's a tough conference."

All of the 7-4A games will be tough, Volarvich said. "Ashdown has five D1 prospects. I don't know of many who can say that. They have the top player in the state. No one else can say that. They'll be tough to beat."

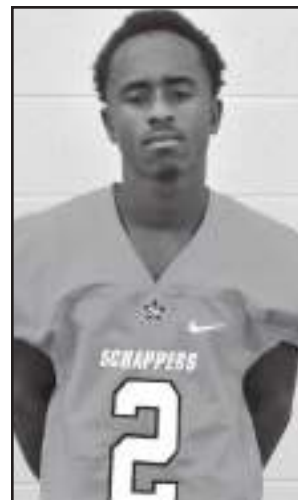
Robinson has "9-10 [D1 or D2] college players. I don't know of another coach who will tell you he has 10 college players. People will tell you that games are won with Jimmys and Joes, not X's and O's. They have lots of Jimmys and Joes."

With a number of good teams in 7-4A, Volarvich looks for "an interesting year. We'll see how it plays out."

As defending district and state champions, "We'll get everybody else's A game. We're somebody's Super Bowl every week. If they can knock off the Scrappers, they'll have a party on our field."

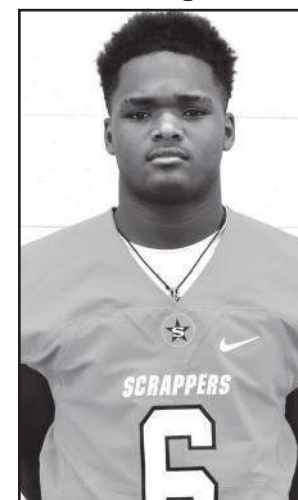

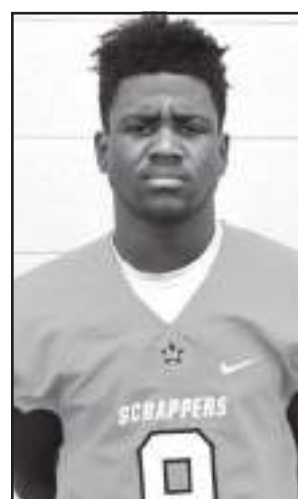

It doesn't take long for Coach Brad Chesshir to make his point about his Scrapper defensive unit - "I want all our Pumpkin Heads to fly to the football and get there with a nasty attitude."

Chesshir, the team's defensive coordinator and a former Scrapper himself, understands Nashville's tradition and the community's expectations. And he embraces them.

Defensive lineman Marquell McFalls "is getting better each and every day. His alignments and assignments are better."

Kirby Adcock, an offensive lineman who has verbally committed to the Arkansas Razorbacks, will play on defense as well. "He's an offensive line guy, but he will help on the D-line when needed."

Two sophomores, Bubba Reeder and Robert Dunham, are working at defensive line positions. "It's tough to step into the trenches, especially for sophomores," Chesshir said. "They're doing good quality work."

Nose guard Shun Childress is "so much stronger. So much better. He brings a lot of energy to the table."

Senior linebackers Gordon and Michael Bevell are 2 of the top 10 tacklers from last season. Gordon is "the leader on defense. He helps with alignment issues. He's a smash-mouth player. He loves contact, loves stopping the run, has his mind right to compete."

Senior Hunter White played safety last year but is an outside linebacker now. "He's so smooth. He reads the play. He's smart at his position."

Seniors Jordan Summers and Dalton Smead will see duty at outside linebacker.

Chesshir expects sophomore Kalob Carpenter "to be productive" at the position.

Sophomore Xavier Nunally will play at inside linebacker. "He's so fast. He gets to the ball so quickly. He's come a long way since spring," Chesshir said.

Dennis Scott and Davion Holmes will see action at corner. Scott is entering his first year and has

shown "a lot of potential." Safety Kailus Hughes "isn't going to be big, but he's very smart. He will swarm to the football and get there with a nasty attitude."

Jordan White "flies to the football. He was in on 12 plays and made 6 tackles at the Bash. Very coachable, high character."

Overall, Chesshir says his defenders are ready "to step up and play. They're a good, solid group. They're progressing to swarming to the ball. Now we'll do our best to go to war with those guys."

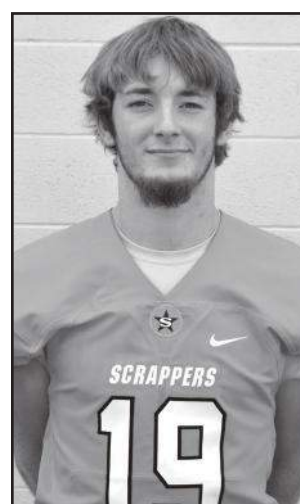

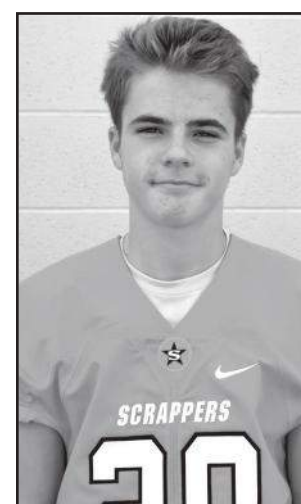

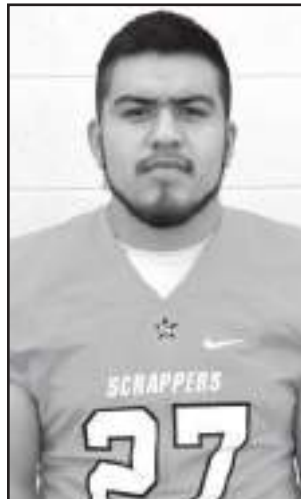

Good numbers, good summer for Nashville Junior High team

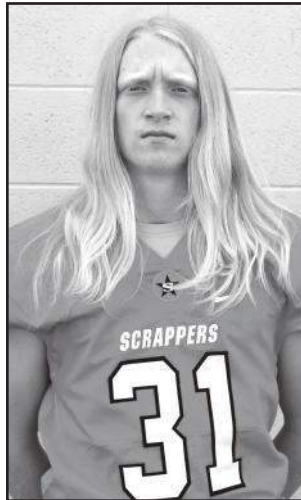
The Scappers have a transfer from Idabel, Corbin Cooper, who's had "a good summer."

Corners will be Cole Little and Devon Reisinger.

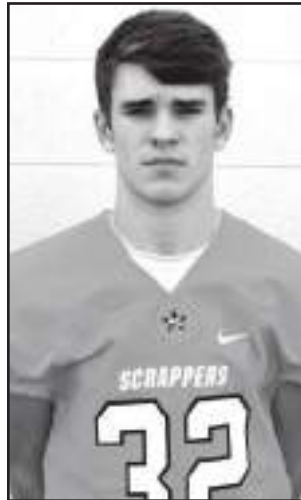
With the season eight days away, Baker said he and the team are ready for it to start. "I'm looking forward to the year."

New coach takes over at Dierks

"I'm flattered to be here," said Coach Vince Perrin about his return to District 7-2A football where he has taken over for David Bennett, who developed and steered the Dierks Outlaw program for 16 seasons.

"If a guy can stay at one school for 16 years, it tells you he's done a great job," Perrin said, crediting Bennett with "resurrecting the program" and keeping the Outlaws competitive for so many years. "To step in here and experience what he experienced is a major deal. To be in these shoes is very flattering."

Perrin was hired in May to replace Bennett. He comes to Dierks after a

two-year stint as head coach and athletic director at Stuttgart. Perrin also coached at Mineral Springs for two seasons, Arkadelphia, Springdale, Bearden, Greenwood, Clinton, Lakeside and Alma. The former Ouachita Baptist University Tiger standout also played the 2001 season with the Bossier City Battle Wings in the AF2 League, a developmental league of the Arena Football League.

Just a few weeks ago, Perrin was still trying to learn his players' first and last names. There have been plenty of changes around the field house and on the practice field for both the players and coaching staff since Perrin arrived. "Everything was

new, from X's and O's, to how we train, and they've done an outstanding job," Perrin said. "I couldn't be more pleased."

A lot has changed, but a lot has stayed the same and Perrin said he hopes to build on the familiar foundation already in place.

"I think the biggest change is the terminology," he said. "We all 'block down,' we all 'kick out' but the way we call things now and the way they've called things in the past are two totally different things. It could be the same thing, but it's different terminology and I think that's been the biggest hurdle for the kids to get over."

The Outlaw traditional spread-to-run offense will continue but the "I" forma-

tion will be there if needed. "You've got to be multiple," the coach said. "We are 50-50 run-pass, but I think when the weather gets bad you better have something that you can get under center with."

Perrin will be calling the shots on both offense and defense, something new on the Outlaw sidelines. "My passion is offense but I've kind of gotten known as a defensive guy and here I'm getting back on the offensive side," he said, adding that he is pleased with his assistants who are "doing their jobs well."

The Outlaw coaching staff is rounded out by Jeff Tipton, Stephen Sprick, Dustin Bissell, Kevin Alexander and Greg "Double G" Gibson.

Senior Caleb Adams will return to steer the Outlaw offense this season. Perrin described Adams, whose twin brother, Cale, will line up behind him at fullback, as "very attentive" to detail and eager to learn. "He's done a really good job, like I said, everything's new to everybody, but he's really caught on to the offense," Perrin added.

Along with the Adams boys, junior Brayden Kirby and senior Peyton Frachiseur will line up in the backfield that probably still bears the cleat marks left by one of Dierks' all-time rushers Trendin McKinney.

"Brayden has some good speed, but he's definitely a 'power-cat' guy," Perrin said.

Return starter and senior Lane Woodruff will line up outside as receiver and junior Jarett Fox will be at tight end. Seniors Cale Adams, Colton Strode, Bradley Lowery, Jacob Sharp and Bradley Lowery will also be part of the receiver corps.

The offense will line up behind three seniors - Dalton Sherk at right guard, Gabe Humphreys at left guard and Andrew Hilton at left tackle - along with sophomore right tackle Cameron Pugh.

The Outlaw defensive line will see plenty two-way starters with Kirby, Cale Adams, Humphreys and senior Jesse Martin expected to see time at

linebacker. Fox, Hilton and sophomores Sam Maxey and John Wilbanks will rotate in at defensive end and senior Jed Morrow will return at tackle with Sherk and senior Brent Armstrong.

Perrin said he has been pleased with his 17-player strong senior class and expects their leadership to help carry the team this season.

"They are great kids," said Perrin about his upperclassmen and the encouragement and positive reinforcement he has seen so far. "When players start getting together like a family, I think that's a good recipe there."

The new coach also appreciates the built-in toughness that comes naturally with Outlaw Football. "Very tough kids," Perrin said. "And that puts a smile on my face."

Perrin will look to rebound the Outlaws after the team finished the 2015 season with a 6-5 mark and a 28-8 loss to Conway Christian in Round 1 of the playoffs.

The first curve on the road to recovery is this Friday night against the Horatio Lions and their new head coach, David Bennett.

"It is what it is and we're going to show up and try to win the game," Perrin said. "We're going to play everyone one of them to win."

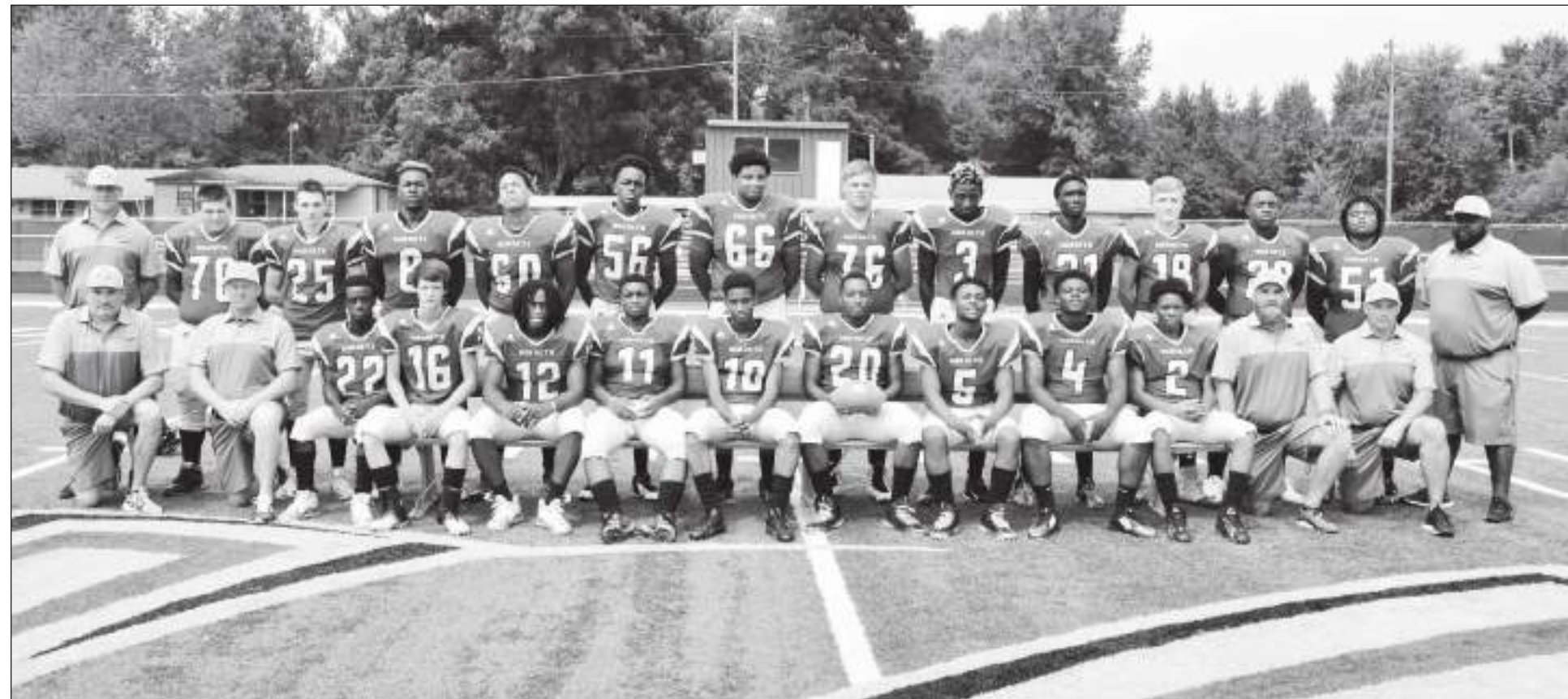

Hornets look to jump out early this season

The numbers are down even more than they were last year; and there are only three seniors on the team roster; but Mineral Springs Head Coach Jason Burns says this team has a quality more abundant than any squad he's ever coached.

"This group is tight," he said, meaning closely connected by friendship and respect.

The Hornets hope to improve upon last year's 2-7 record in 2015.

"We need to start out better than we did last year," the fourth-year head coach said.

The Green and Gold return seven starters on both offense and defense, although most of those players go both ways.

"We've got a pretty good offensive line," Burns said, to go with a full stable of talented running backs. The Hornets will also depend upon the run more than the pass.

Burns describes his defense as "pretty solid," and senior linebacker Fred Robinson is among a good group playing behind the Hornet defensive line.

Sophomores are coming up from a junior squad which posted a 6-2 record last year. The three seniors on the 2016 Hornet squad are Fred Robinson, wide receiver Kevonte Esters and defensive back Chase Murphy.

After fighting through a tough non-conference slate of Fouke, Strong and Center Point, Burns says the Hornets will not find easier going in conference games. He looks for most of the league teams to be improved, and Mountain Pine has replaced Gurdon

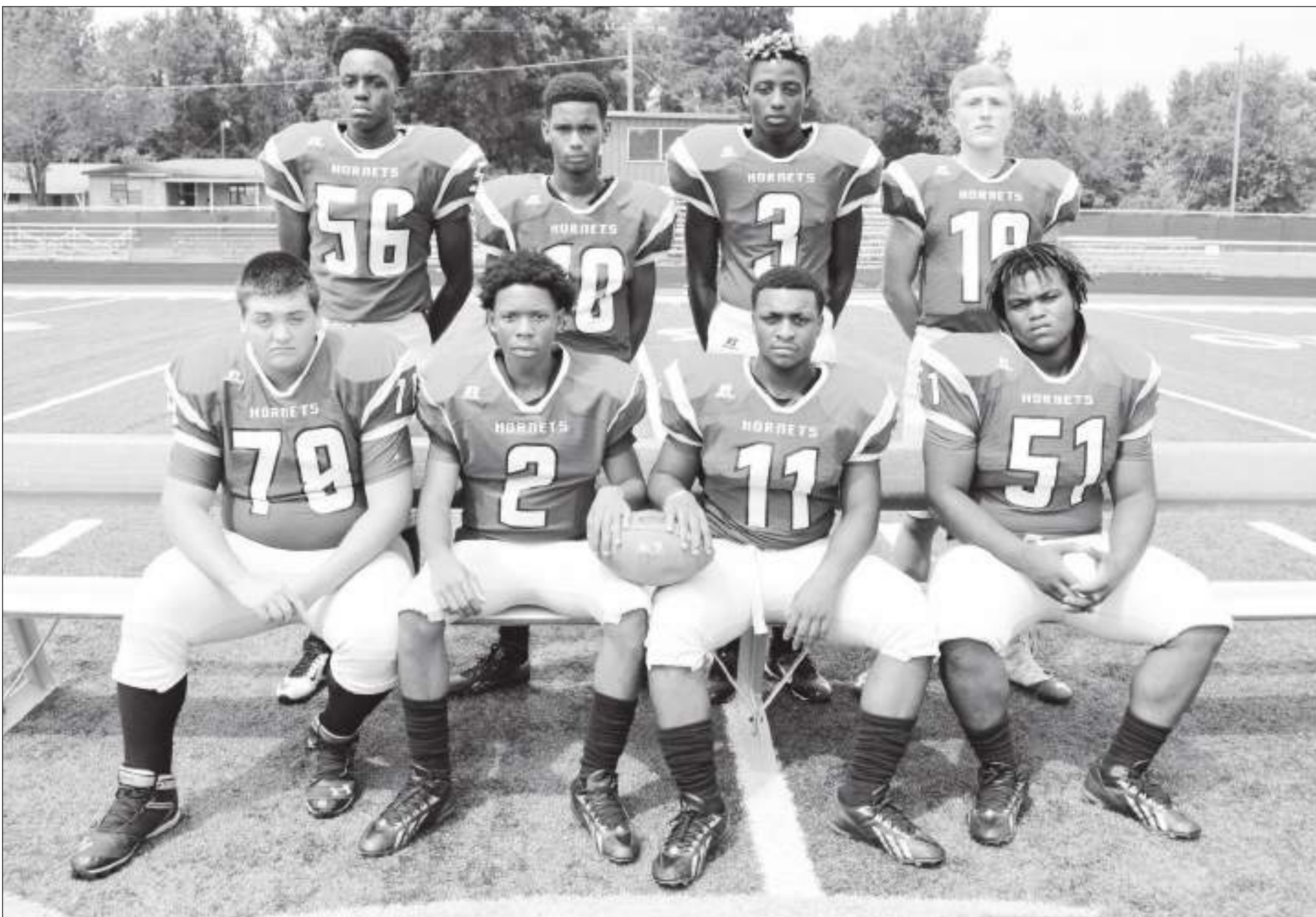

Rattlers look to open up passing game

Rattler Head Coach Jeff Jones is ready for his team to open the 2016 season and see what they really have to offer.

"We're at the point where we can scrimmage and practice as much as we want, but we need to start playing other teams to get better," Jones said. "Sometimes, you have to play other teams to really show what your strengths and weaknesses are so you can start working on them."

Jones had hoped to start the new season with everyone healthy. When the team convened to start the practice season, Jones thought he would achieve that goal after spending the majority of last season dealing with various hurt players, particularly his starting quarterback and a running back he expected to lead the team.

Senior quarterback Ryan Roberts is now healthy after getting hurt early last season and eventually being sidelined for the remainder of the 2015 schedule. Senior flanker Cameron Snowden, who Jones said is the team's quickest player, is also now healthy after a nagging injury kept him from giving 100 percent last season.

"They're both finally back...and that's good," Jones laughed.

But, no more than he had made the comment, senior running back Gavin Gardner, who lead the team last year with more than 1,200 yards rushing, walked into the coaches' office, his broken hand from a non-football injury cradled in a cast and still swollen from a recent surgery.

"Four to six weeks," Jones said about Gardner's expected return.

Jones will look to Roberts, Snowden, senior Jack Stuard and junior Tyler Tomlinson to fill the gap in the backfield left by Gardner's injury. Providing the push at fullback will be senior Chris French, who sat out last year after being hurt in an ATV wreck, and junior Bryle Fatheree.

"They are both hard-nosed," Jones said of his fullbacks. "Chris has really

matured and we expect him to really step up his senior year."

Jones also hopes to showcase Roberts' accuracy with a passing game expanded by the team's spread offense.

"He's usually 95 percent accurate," Jones said. In the Red/White scrimmage game, Roberts was quick getting off long fade passes that found their targets in senior Troy Stone and junior J.C. Motley. Stuard and junior tight end Jarrett Faulkner are also expected targets for the Rattler passing game.

Jones and his coaching staff also spent the practice season putting together a new front line to replace the experienced linemen that graduated last year. Expected down front are seniors Wyatt Van Camp, Laramie Beshears and Nathan Libranda, juniors Evan Pickett, Skylar Duke and Alec Pettigrew and sophomores Ethan Pickett and Brody Hignight.

"They're pretty young but I like their attitude a lot. I like the way they are coming along," Jones said. "They will give us some depth in this area."

Jones said a big emphasis was put on defense this practice season. Many of the offensive line will step across to defense with back-up expected from sophomore Sam Corson and junior Cody Nolan with Faulkner down inside at tackle. Ethan Pickett will also work at linebacker along with French.

The Rattler secondary will have plenty of speed with senior Scott Evans, who also missed last season due to injury, and Stuard expected to see time at defensive end, Stone at corner and Roberts at safety.

Motley, sophomore Dawson Watts and junior Jamie Jackson will also work at the corner position.

"We need to work at getting off blocks and making tackles, but I like they way we are getting to the ball on that side," Jones said of his defense.

Jones said he expects this year's strong point to be how the team bonds together.

"The best thing about this team is just how tight

they are together," he said. "They really support each other."

The coach is also expecting his senior class to provide the leadership and experience needed for a winning season.

"They understand, for the most part, that football can't be a selfish sport," Jones said. "They're pretty selfless guys and they un-

derstand their role in accomplishing that."

Murfreesboro will open the season at home Friday night with a Rattler-on-Rattler contest when they host Magazine.

Next up is Horatio at Horatio and Hampton at Hampton before the Rattlers return to host back-to-back conference game against Lafayette County

(homecoming) and Mount Ida, who are picked No. 1 and No. 2, respectively.

"We've got the two top teams right off the bat," Jones said. "So, we need to get this thing together in a hurry."

Conference newcomers Mountain Pine will host the Rattlers on Oct. 7 before Mineral Springs takes Holloway Field on Oct. 14

followed by another home game with Spring Hill.

The Rattlers will close out the regular season with road games to Foreman on Oct. 28 and Dierks on Thursday, Nov. 3.

"I think, from top to bottom, we have one of the most competitive conferences," Jones said.

"You know, that's what makes it fun."

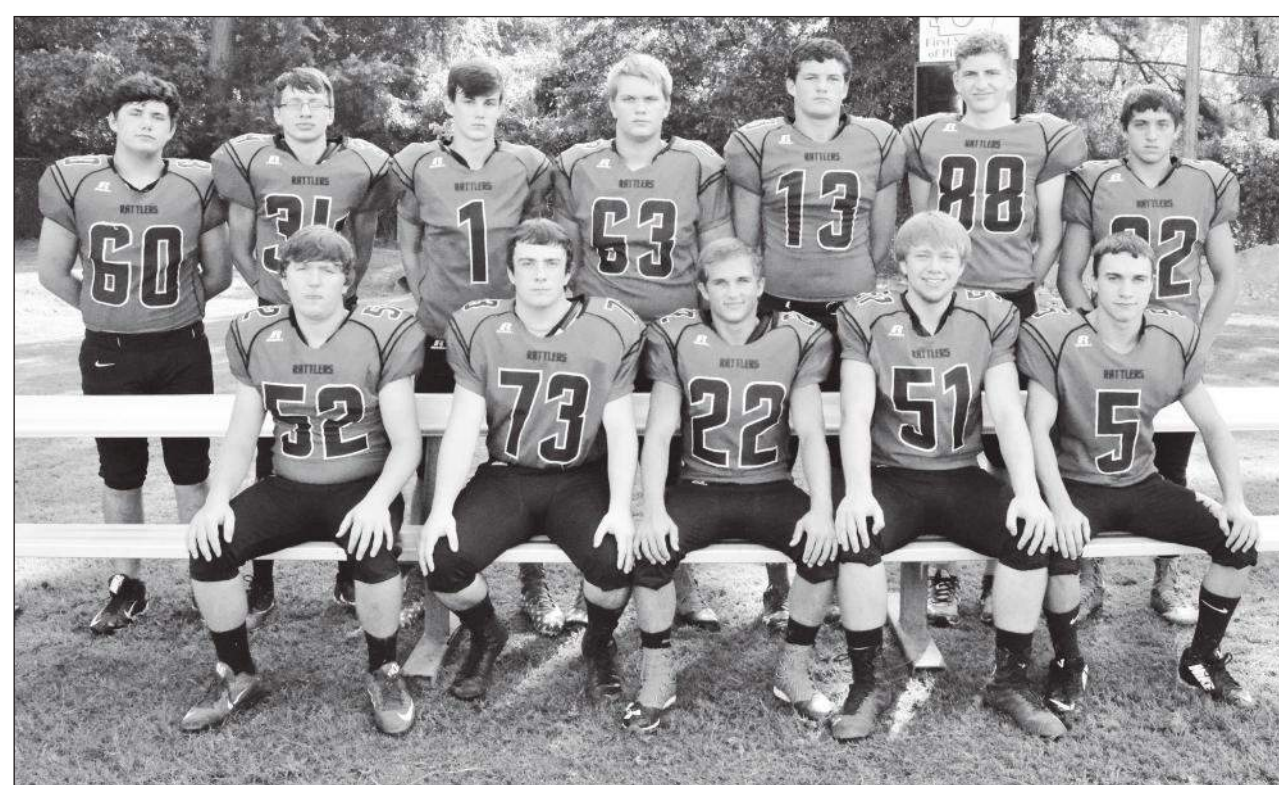
