MCSO arrests another Texas Fugitive

Montgomery County Sheriff David White has reported another arrest involving a fugitive from another state residing in Montgomery County.

According to Sheriff White He was contacted by law enforcement officers from Brazoria County Texas about information regarding a fugitive that might have been in Montgomery County. The suspect, identified as Eric Nicholas Gonzales, was wanted for an aggravated assault felony charge in Brazoria County Texas. The charge was filed after Gonzales, age 27, allegedly pointed a gun at a woman in Texas.

An investigation launched by the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) revealed that Gonzales had been living in a maroon Ford SUV somewhere between Crystal Springs and Hickory Nut Mountain.

Tuesday, August 21, Gonzales was spotted sitting in his Ford SUV behind a McDonald's located at the Piney Junction in Hot Springs. Sheriff White notified Arkansas State

The fall armyworm is a summer/fall pest primarily of Bermuda grass and other warm season grasses, but it can also damage fall-seeded, newly established winter annuals, fescue and orchard grass. In southern Arkansas, we can expect to see fall armyworm damage in Bermuda grass as early as July. We can expect to have fall armyworm damage in south Arkansas forage about every year.

Damage from fall armyworms can seem to appear overnight. Although the damage might appear overnight, larvae have likely been feeding for a week or more before they or their damage appear. This is because when the worms are small they do not eat much. It is not until they get larger that they begin consuming large amounts of forage. In addition, large armyworms may move into an uninfested field adjacent to a field that was just defoliated. Because armyworms are so destructive and compete with livestock for forage, producers should diligently scout

susceptible fields for the fall armyworm in July.

Habits and Damage

Fall armyworm damage often appears as a browned or burned-out patch resembling drought damage. The damaged patch will usually increase in size as the fall armyworm consumes more foliage. The brown color results from drying of the plant due to dehydration after armyworms chew tender growth. Often, after a severe fall armyworm infestation, the only vegetation left in the field will be tough stems. Fall armyworms seldom kill healthy, established Bermuda grass. However, newly established stands of Bermuda grass, winter annuals, fescue or orchard grass are at risk of stunting or dying.

Fall armyworm outbreaks are more likely during periods of drought because some of their natural enemies are less active during droughts. Fall armyworm outbreaks in Arkansas often occur as the grass greens from rain that has broken a prolonged dry period. Fall armyworm outbreaks may occur as early as July and continue into the fall. Well fertilized Bermuda grass seems to be the preferred fall armyworm habitat.

Although fall armyworms feed more actively in early morning and late afternoon, they may eat throughout most of the day in tall forage. Fall armyworms often conceal themselves during the brightest part of the day.

Scouting

The first and best approach to limiting armyworm damage in forage production is scouting for these pests before economic damage occurs. Producers should also watch for flocks of birds feeding in fields because birds will exploit armyworms as a ready food source. Early signs of armyworm damage by small caterpillars include leaves that are chewed on the underside only and fields with a slight “frosted” appearance. Other latter signs of armyworm outbreaks are dead areas of fields and caterpillars stuck on vehicle tires driven through the field.

Control

Control decisions should be based on treatment thresholds derived from sampling the field. In general, insecticide treatment is warranted if three or more half-grown armyworms per square foot are present. The best way to conduct sampling is to make at least 10 random

samples across the field look for areas of damage to sample. Also remember that moths often lay eggs in the lushest part of the field, so include a few samples from these areas. A sampling device constructed of ½ or ¾ PVC pipe that covers one square foot makes the sampling much easier. After the sampling device is randomly dropped, carefully examine grass blades, stems, plant bases and thatch for caterpillars. Record the number and approximate size of the caterpillars found within the perimeter of the sampling device.

Proper timing of insecticide application results in better control. In most cases, insecticide control is warranted when an average of three or more worms per square foot occurs. However, other factors, such as the size of the caterpillars and maturity of the hay crop, should be considered before making an insecticide application. For example, if a hay field is heavily infested and the grass is ready to harvest, consider cutting and baling as soon as possible rather than making an insecticide application. If the field is not ready to cut and you have more than three very small (1/8 to ¼ inch) caterpillars per



square foot, do not treat before necessary. Instead, get the equipment ready to spray and monitor the field closely, because natural enemies could possibly reduce the population below treatment threshold within a short period of time. If the population is not reduced, then treat when the caterpillars reach ½ inch. Caterpillars larger than ¾ inch are difficult to kill, resulting in poor control. Fully grown caterpillars (1½ inches) are close to pupation and may have already caused most of the damage, thus an insecticide application may not provide an economic benefit.

current senior class were freshmen.

Both games will kick off at 7 p.m.

Mount Ida’s non conference schedule will be a challenging one with the Lions traveling to Jessieville in week two before returning to Preston Stidman Field September 14 for their home opener against Magnet Cove.

The Lions will open their conference schedule at home September 21 with Mineral Springs. They will travel to Murfreesboro September 28 and return home October 5 for Homecoming against Spring Hill.

The conference title could be determined October 12 as the Lions travel to Foreman for a rematch of last year’s 2A state championship match up. Mount Ida returns home October 19 to face the Dierks Outlaws and travel to Gurdon October 26.

Mount Ida wraps up the 2018 regular season with a Thursday game November 1 at home against Lafayette County.

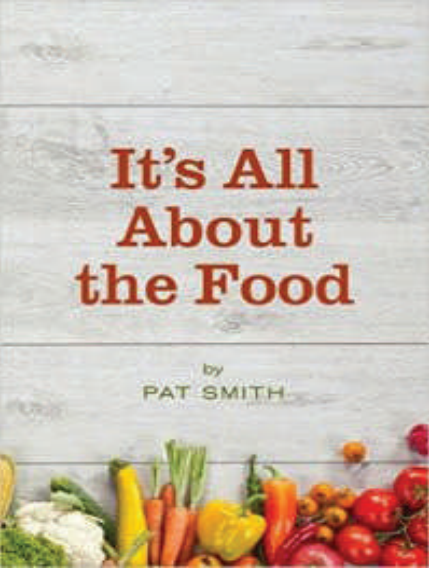
The Junior Lions follow their home opener against Magazine with another home game August 30 when they welcome the Jessieville Junior Lions to town.

Vegan or Vegetarian? Or Maybe Carnivore?



One of the things that the Paleo, Keto, and even the Mediterranean diet have in common is the presence of meat protein. Sometimes lots of meat protein, sometimes less but still there. Now for something different.

A vegetarian is meat free but generally comes in variations on a theme. One variation allows meat by-products like eggs and /or dairy. Another variation allows fish. Then there are folks who operate in the “most of the time” variation. “I don’t eat meat except on very special occasions; otherwise I eat vegetables and an occasional egg.”

Unfortunately they often consider commercially processed foods and seed oils perfectly ok because they aren’t “meat”.

The interesting thing about vegetarianism is that people seem to pick this diet for reasons not associated with nutritional value. Maybe because they feel sorry for the animals (I don’t want to eat anything with a face), don’t like the taste of meat, or believe that the natural resources required to grow animal meat is environmentally wasteful. In my experience most vegetarians just eat what they eat and don’t feel driven to convert the masses.

When you shift from vegetarian to

vegan, however, it can be an extreme shift. Honey isn’t allowed because it is manufactured by bees. Sometimes animal skins are nixed. Sometimes animals are considered sacred and killing them is cruel.

So vegans only eat plant food and even then many consider animal based fertilizers like manure or blood meal unacceptable. See what I mean about extreme? These are people with a passion who sometimes ARE driven to convert the masses.

This really isn’t the most extreme, however. Raw vegan is the full extreme with emphasis on maintaining the highest nutrient levels in the plants. Cooking reduces and often destroys the enzymes required to digest food.

Food can only be considered raw if the natural enzymes remain intact. So “cooked” food must be below 115 degrees internal temperature. That can usually only be accomplished by using a dehydrator. The time required to dehydrate can be very long.

Let me share with you my one week personal experience in a raw vegan institute. The kitchen had only dehydrators, busy all of the time. The day we ate grapefruit for breakfast was the highlight of my week. Some people will do anything in the interest of research. I was not sold but I assure you there were others there who were “all in.”

There are drawbacks to eliminating meat products from the diet.

Vitamin B12 is an essential dietary element that is absent in a vegan diet. Also missing are two essential omega 3 fatty acids commonly found in wild caught fatty seafood and pasture raised animals. Further vitamin A can be a problem. Vitamin A is present and immediately bio available in meat. Beta carotene in plants can be converted to vitamin A by the body unless your genes cause a problem. That

would be me.

That all means that, at least for a vegan, supplements will be required to make up for deficiencies. Actually the required amount of B12 and omega 3 is relatively small so a vegetarian who incorporates some eggs, dairy such as cheese, and occasional fish in the diet can be fine.

A carnivore diet, on the other hand, is just meat and meat products. Most of the people I have kept up with on a carnivore diet were first on a low carb/higher fat version of Keto. Eventually they found themselves still troubled symptomatically with vegetables in their diet. So they went straight carnivore and their problems went away.

Would you be surprised to know that, for some people, there can also be side effects to a carnivore diet. More about that in my next article.

The bad news in any diet is the presence of commercially processed foods and seed oils. This is not a problem for raw vegans or carnivores. But as I said above, it can be a common problem for vegetarians. My book shares the example of one “vegetarian” I observed in a buffet eating food that was full of sugar and fried in bad oil. Rest assured, however, there was no meat.

As I said in an earlier article, some 50 million or so Americans have one or more autoimmune diseases. While toxins and genes can be a factor, the most common issue is digestive problems with some plant food(s) for that one person. That means that some people can do just fine with a vegetarian or even vegan (with supplements) diet and others will not. I know of real people who fall into both categories.

What’s important for everyone is making dietary choices that are right for them. In my next article I will try to help you make the right decision for YOU.

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U.S. Army Corps of Engineers issues Labor Day message



Farewell to summer, for autumn make way, with this last celebration we call Labor Day (Nancy Hughes)....

Thank you to our patrons for making summer 2018 on Lake Ouachita a safe and enjoyable one! Many will be venturing out on one final summer trip to the lake over Labor Day weekend, and recreation areas will be very busy. The Corps of Engineers asks you to continue practicing safety while enjoying the lake. It is easy to take safety for granted after recreating multiple times over the summer with no accidents, but the minute you become complacent, is when accidents occur. Unfortunately, a careless mistake can mean the dif-

ference between life and death when on the water. Almost all drownings that have occurred could have been prevented if the individuals had been wearing a lifejacket. Wearing a lifejacket while boating is just as important as wearing a seatbelt in your car! Lifejackets stored in boat compartments may not be in the condition they were in at the beginning of the summer, so check all life-jackets for damage such as rips, tears, and broken buckles. Before you hit the water, remember to check your boat for the proper safety equipment, tell someone where you will be recreating, carry a cell phone, never boat alone, and wear your properly fitting lifejacket. Park Rangers will be available at area boat ramps over the Labor Day weekend performing random courtesy boat safety inspections. Life jacket loaner boards are available at all Corps of Engineers swimming areas and visitors are

welcome to borrow a life jacket, then return it at the end of the day. WEAR IT for your family, WEAR IT for your friends, WEAR IT for yourself!

Parents, watch your children ALL TIMES when they are in or near the water. It only takes 20 seconds for a child to drown. Never dive or jump from rocks or cliffs on lakes and rivers. Watch for underwater hazards and floating debris while boating, and use a depth finder to detect shallow areas. Never operate a boat, or go swimming while under the influence of drugs or alcohol. The hot temperatures combined with alcohol or drugs are a deadly combination that can severely impair judgment and dehydrate your body.

Looking for an enjoyable pastime during the winter months? Enroll in swim lessons! Swim lessons are a fun way to learn an important life-saving skill. Many drownings occur because the victim was a poor swimmer, or they overestimated their swimming ability. If you are not an avid swimmer, take the time to enroll in swimming lessons. Learning to swim well is an important skill to master for you and your family.

Also, water toys such

as Frisbees, beach balls, and floats that have been carried away by the wind are accidents waiting to happen. Suppress the urge to swim after these items, as the wind combined with water currents can carry objects across the water faster than the strongest swimmers. Let It Go...it could be the difference in life and death.

The Corps of Engineers, Lake Ouachita hopes everyone has had a summer filled with wonderful outdoor experiences and great memories to last a lifetime.

Fall is an excellent time to visit the lake and enjoy Arkansas’ outdoors! From fishing, hunting, miles of hiking and biking trails, an outdoor exercise station, geocaching, and roasting marshmallows and drinking hot-chocolate while star-gazing under the beautiful night sky.... there is something for everyone.

Senior laden squad looking for third consecutive trip to “The Rock”

The Mount Ida Lions find themselves familiar territory this year with statewide Top 10 rankings listing the Lions among the top 5 teams in 2A football.

The Lions enter the 2018 season with back to back trips to the 2A state championship game under their belt and a roster filled with seniors. The Lions worked their way through the 2017 season undefeated right up to the championship game where they lost to the Foreman Gators 27-24.

This season presents its share of challenges with only 20 players currently on the roster. Coach Mike White worked his team through a limited Summer schedule and stated that staying healthy is his biggest concern right now. “They were ready to play at the Prescott Team Camp.” Coach White stated when asked about his team.

Experience won’t be an issue with this year’s team with 15 of the 20 players entering their third season. Coach White pointed out that one of the things their past success has done is provide the kids with a lot of experience. The senior members of the team have over 30 games under their belts as they enter week one of the upcoming season.

A senior laden backfield will be at the heart of Mount Ida’s success with seniors Cade Jackson, Jonathan Lagrange and Gage Dyer stepping into familiar rolls.

Jackson is set to begin his third season as the starting quarterback for the senior squad. He rushed for 986 yards last year and caught a pass for

a touchdown in the championship game against Foreman. His greatest contribution to the team may be his ability to read defenses after the ball is snapped and make adjustments on the fly.

Lagrange has been the workhorse of this squad since pee-wee. Nicknamed “Mule” at an early age, he is known for lowering his head and running through defenses. He rushed for 1,279 yards last year and was named the 2017 Kevin Payne 2A Player of the Year by 42Sports.org.

Gage Dyer fills the Z-Back position once again. His speed was missed a good part of last season due to injury, but returns stronger and faster than ever this season. He provides the Lions with a dual threat that is hard to scheme for by defenses. He is by far the Lions’ best passing threat and can turn a short gain into a touchdown on any play.

Tyler Hamilton steps into the backfield this year, joining the group of seniors that are expected to lead by example. Hamilton brings a versatility to the running game that comes from playing a variety of positions in years past. He spent most of last season as a receiver, or tight end. This experience will give Mount Ida an additional blocking back, as well as another threat in the air from the backfield.

Senior Colton Yates will also be expected to contribute in the air and on the ground after missing last season due to an off the field injury. Fellow senior Jaythan Dillon will see snaps at split end and wide receiver.

Junior Hunter Davis may be pound for pound one of the strongest player

on the team. He will use that strength at the tight end position where he will join senior Luke Fiorello. Fiorello has proven himself as an anchor on the corner of the offensive line. He can also catch a ball when needed.

Move in John Hoeksema will split his time between tight end and split end. Seth Standridge will see time at the running back position and wide receiver.

If the offense is the heart of the Lions’ success then the offensive line is the soul. Teams will be sadly mistaken if they think the graduation of many of last year’s offensive linemen will weaken Mount Ida’s offense. They bring a mix of size and strength to the line of scrimmage with many familiar faces moving to new positions.

Drew Allen steps in as center after playing the last two years as a guard. Beside him at guard will be Ethan Winkley and Ty Abernathy. Coach White

projects Kirklyn Sorrell and Oscar Pinedo to be important keys to their success at tackle.

Coach White stated that Pinedo was shifted to tackle to make room for Winkley at guard.

“Winkley is more of a guard type so we moved Pinedo to tackle.” He stated.

Coach White bragged on Abernathy who moves to the guard position after lining up as a skill player most of his career. The change in position required a jersey number change, but that didn’t bother Abernathy.

“When I approached Ty about moving to the line he told me, ‘Whatever I need to do to help the team win.’” Coach White remarked about the move.

Sorrell played a lot last year in the Jumbo package and will step into a full time roll on the line.

Filling his spot in the Jumbo package will be sophomore Hunter Humphries. Coach White has been pleased with his improvement on the field and expects his playing time to increase as the season progresses.
