MURFREESBORO -- The Pike County Courthouse and associated offices will be closed this Friday, April 7, in observance of Good Friday that precedes Easter on Sunday, April 9.

The City of Murfreesboro will also observe Good Friday and close their offices this Friday.

Inside the city, Friday's normal sanitation route will be collected on Thursday with that day's regularly scheduled collection.

All offices will reopen on Monday morning, April 10.

CASA announces activities, seeks county advocates

MURFREESBORO -- The Pike and Clark County chapter of the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) has several events planned in observance of April's Child Abuse Prevention month.

The group, which advocated for children in the foster care system is also looking for local volunteers to aid their reach.

"Many of the kids in foster care have been abused or neglected, so in many cases we have to step in for parents and look out for the kids in the courtroom and classroom," said Celeste Davis of CASA.

Anyone interested in being a part of the effort can receive free training.

There are currently 18 children in foster care from Pike County, and only four of that total has a CASA advocate.

"There is definitely a need," said Davis. "It's our overall goal that each one of these kids has a CASA advocate."

For the upcoming programming, Pike County Judge Eddie Howard will issue a proclamation declaring April child abuse prevention month in Pike County at the Pike County Courthouse at 11 a.m. this Wednesday, April 5.

On Thursday, April 6, at 3:30 p.m. CASA volunteers will place pinwheels on the Pike County Courthouse grounds in awareness of the 18 kids currently in foster care.

On April 15, a bingo event at The Willows in Glenwood will donate a portion of the proceeds to CASA and THE CALL, another organization benefitting foster children.

Then, on May 4, a Garden Party Bunco fundraising event for CASA will be held under the direction of CASA boardmember Anna Howard of Murfreesboro and Celeste May of Delight.

In addition to Anna Howard, the other Pike County resident on the CASA board is Tamara Horn of Glenwood.

Pair charged with attempt to cut dog's throat

MURFREESBORO -- Felony charges have been filed in Pike County against two Delight brothers accused of aggravated cruelty to an animal.

On March 30, charges were filed against Dakota Rector, 27, and Cody Rector, 31. They are both accused of aggravated cruelty to a dog, cat or equine and criminal trespass.

According to case information, a citizen contacted the Pike County Sheriff's Department to report that the two men had come onto her property and attempted to cut her dog's throat. The incident was caught by a security camera. The dog survived the incident after receiving stitches to close the wound on its neck.

Both defendants made court appearances Monday when they both plead innocent to the charges. They were ordered to return to court

May 1 with a June 2 pretrial date set for both case.

Also in court Monday, Taylor Wilkerson, 20, of Murfreesboro, plead guilty to the charges of commercial burglary and criminal mischief for breaking into the Murfreesboro Elementary School in February. He was sentenced to 10 years of probation.

Marshall E. Black, 22, of Norman, plead guilty to the charge of possession of a controlled substance. He was sentenced to five years of probation and 120 days in the Arkansas Correction Center and fined \$2,500 plus court costs.

Joshua W. Hill, 42, of Delight, plead guilty to two counts of possession of a controlled substance. He was sentenced to five years of probation and fined \$2,500 plus court costs. He

also plead guilty to probation revocation and was sentenced to 120 days in the Community Corrections Center.

Thomas Tigue, 48, of Bonnerdale plead guilty Monday to the charges of possession of meth. He was sentenced to one year in the Arkansas Department of Corrections (ADC).

James Calvary McSweeney, 60, of Amity plead guilty to failure to comply with registration and reporting requirements of being a sex offender. He was sentenced to three years in the ADC.

Jeremy A. Combs, 34, unknown address, plead guilty to the charges of theft of property, breaking or entering and probation revocation. He was sentenced to a total of five years in the ADC.

After a home disaster, what should you do?

LITTLE ROCK — One of the most difficult parts of disaster recovery is managing the paperwork that follows.

Laura Hendrix, an extension personal finance expert for the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture, offers this checklist to those trying to figure out what they need to do:

- Contact your insurance agent — "One of the first things for people with losses or damage is to contact their insurance agent," she said. "Procedures will vary by company and policy."

- Taxes — The tax filing deadline this year is Monday, April 18. Even as you navigate this disaster, "taxpayers can file for an extension," Hendrix said. "Any losses would fall under next year's taxes." The Internal Revenue Service has a page dedicated to taxes and disasters.
- Replacing lost papers — "Documents such

as birth certificates, insurance policies and health records may be lost or destroyed," she said. "Prompt replacement prevents delays when the documents are needed."

- Insurance Policy — Contact your insurance agency for a copy of your policy. If you have any trouble locating the company, contact the Arkansas Department of Insurance at 501-371-2600 or .
- Social Security Card — Order a replacement social security card online at gov/myaccount or visit your nearest Social Security office.

- Driver's License — To replace a driver's license, visit your local revenue office.
- Property Deeds — Contact your local Circuit Clerk's office for property deeds.
- Passport — Visit your local Postal Service office for a new passport.
- Birth certificate, death, marriage, and divorce certificates — Visit the Arkansas Department of Health's websites for Certificates & Records or Vital Records.

The American Red Cross also advises vic-

times of natural disasters to:

- Stop unnecessary expenses — For example, if your home is uninhabitable, notify the utility company and other service companies, such as phone, internet and cable companies, so they can stop billing immediately.
- Assess your funds — Estimate the amount of income and emergency savings you have to pay bills while you recover from the disaster, then prioritize your bills. Paying your insurance premiums and rent or mortgage should be your top priority.

- Talk to your creditors — Ask creditors for more time to pay. Most creditors will be willing to work with you, especially if you notify them before a payment is due.

BROADBAND COMMITTEE ... The first meeting of the broadband committee in Pike County was held last week in Murfreesboro, with the goal of completely “eliminating the digital divide” by the year 2028. The meeting was part of the initiative to visit all 75 counties in Arkansas and have each county form a broadband committee to set action points and create a wishlist for the future. The goal is to ensuring all residents of the county have access to the internet of speeds no less than 100 megabytes per second (mbps) download and 20 mbps upload, as well as the ability to afford and the digital skills to utilize the service. It is currently estimated that approximately 1,500 residents in Pike County currently do not have access, that 87.4% of the population would qualify for some bill assistance and that approximately 800 residents in the county lack the skills to utilize broadband services. The state is expected to receive 1.5 billion dollars worth of funding from the federal government as part of an infrastructure bill, of which around 800 million dollars to go toward finishing out providing access statewide. Arkansas Baptist announces where to donate for tornado relief

LITTLE ROCK -- Arkansas Baptist Disaster Relief (ABDR) currently has 13 units deployed throughout Arkansas, following the recent severe thunderstorms and tornadoes on Friday, March 31, that left devastation in their wake.

Currently, ABDR has command centers at Immanuel Baptist Church (Little Rock), Levy Baptist Church (North Little Rock), Second Baptist Church (Jacksonville), and Wynne Baptist Church (Wynne). Out of these centers, they are assessing damage as well as providing chaplain services, meals and recovery services for homeowners.

Ten of these ABDR units are in Wynne, two in Little Rock and one in Jacksonville as of April 3. Several other units are on standby.

“We know people are hurting. We’re here to bring help, healing and hope to those in need. We are praying for them and asking for patience as we meet the needs as soon as possible,” ABDR Director Randy Garrett said.

Disaster Relief teams from surrounding states are also aiding in relief and recovery efforts. This includes the Southern Baptists of Texas Disaster Relief, Texas Baptist Men Disaster Relief, and Oklahoma Baptist Disaster Relief.

ABDR teams have been ministering to people impacted by disasters for more than 40 years. The “yellow shirts” have become a stabilizing force of hope and comfort to disaster survivors across the state and around the country.

Currently, ABDR has 1,200 credentialed volunteers ready to serve in the aftermath of disasters. If you would like to donate, visit absdisasterrelief.org.

BEWARE DISASTER SCAMMERS

Immediately after Friday's storms, Arkansas Attorney General Tim Griffin said, "Unfortunately, unscrupulous people will already be preying upon our neighbors with offers of quick repair jobs. Arkansans should call their insurance company first and not be pressured into paying a quick deposit to a person who will take off with their money just as quickly."

Griffin said that insurers will honor their policies and "there is no need to rush or be pressured to sign a contracting agreement."

Without time pressure, Arkansans should:

- Obtain more than one estimate.
- Demand references from contractors and check them.
- Never let a contractor pressure you into hiring them.
- Never sign a contract with blanks "to be filled in later."
- Never pay a contractor in full until the work is finished.
- Never let a contractor discourage you from contacting your insurance company.
- Be sure you review and understand all documents sent to your insurance company.
- Arkansans who want to report concerns can contact the attorney general's office at 800-482-8982.
